

CREED REFORE WEALTH. AN ENGLISHMAN REFUSES, TO RENOUNCE CHRISTIANITY FOR A FORTUNE.

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 5 .- There arrived at the Tecumseh House Sunday morning a young man who registered himself as "B. F. Harris, Chicago." Subsequently he struck out the Harris and wrote "Kearns" over it. A reporter attempted to discover who the parties concerned were, but the matter was kept very quiet, and it was not without difficulty the reporter could fathom the affair. However, in the end, he discovered who the party was they were after, and succeeded in having an interview with him. The principal person in the affair is Mr. Walter Gerson, formerly of Bradford, England, now a resident of this city. Mr. Gerson is a tall, gentlemanly looking Englishman of about 30. He was in business with his father, who is a believer in the Jewish faith, in Bradford, England, but he turned Catholic, and this engendered trouble between the two, which seemingly arose from other causes, but in the main from their difference in creed, and Mr. Walter Gerson at length determined to leave England and come to America, which he did, residing in the States for some time, and not long since coming to this city. After his conversion, Mr. Gerson married a Christian wife. His relatives felt his change of creed very keenly, and have many times attempted to induce him to return home and recant. This he has steadfastly refused to do. He some time ago obtained information that his father was holding a small fortune, which his uncle had left him. His uncle's will stipulated that his nephew should receive the money, provided he be-haved himself. Mr. Gerson's father regarded his turning to the Christian faith as misbehavior, and declined to give up the money until his son went back.

This, however, had no effect on Mr. Gerson. It seems that during the time Mr. Gerson was in business with his father the latter advanced him certain small amounts of money, which the son has not yet repaid, and a threat is now being held over the son's head to com-pel him to go back. This is the mission upon which Mr. Kearns came here. He was not a detective, but simply an agent. His object was to induce Mr. Gerson to return home. A prominent lawyer in the city was engaged, but their success was poor, and in conversation with Mr. Gerson he said he would never forsake the creed he had chosen, and as far as the threats of prosecution for embezzlement were concerned he thought they were only threats, and anyway nothing could be done even if carried to their furthest. He intends remaining in London, and has sent for his wife and family, and is now seeking employment. He expresses the opinion that his father cannot hold the property willed by his uncle on the ground that he has misbehaved by turning Christian, and does not think the courts will support the con-

THE ANGLO-AMERICAN CABLE COM-

PANY. LONDON, Aug. 6. - The half-yearly meeting of the Angle-American Cable Company was held to-day. The report showed a decrease in receipts to the amount of \$13,377, compared with the first half of 1883. The chairman remarked that the company was about to meet with another baleful competition, but its property was in good order. The decrease in the earnings was owing to the depression of trade. Mackey and Bennett were alluded to as "those two fellows." A great deal was said against the way the directors were using the company's money; one likened the board to confidence men playing upon the poor stockholders. It was decided to set apart C75,000 as a renewal fund.

THE IRISH COLLEGE GRANTS LONDON, Aug. 6.—In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Parnell spoke in opposition to the grant to the Queen's Colleges in Ireland. These colleges, he said, should be swept away and their advantages conferred on the de nominational colleges. The interests of education were sacrificed and the money squandered to fill the Queen's colleges with ill-trained students. T. P. O'Connor favored the grant. The grant was carried by a vote of 100 to 35.

TILDEN.

Mr. Samuei J. Tilden is spending a very quiet summer at Greystone. His health has improved perceptibly and he makes daily visits over his estate, superintending various improvements that he is making. He is much interested in the alterations being made in the Viking, preparing her for a Southern trip during the coming winter. The Viking often shows her speed up and down the river.

A TOUCHING APPEAL.

There is a touching pathos in the appeal of Esther Amar, a Jewess at Dar-al Beida (Casabianca), who was cruelly flogged without trial, on a charge of immoral conduct. Her letter to Lord Granville to secure redress, dated at Tangier, closes thus :- "Some friends tell me that in England there is more justice than in this country, and that Her Majesty the Queen would never allow a poor girl to be nearly beaten to death, as I have been, and I beg of your Lordship to tell the Queen about it."

AMERICAN STATESMEN.

A large number of American statesmen started in life as school teachers. William H. Seward and Lyman Trumbull went South as tutors, John Adams taught while studying law, James Madison taught in Virginia, John Quincy Adams taught at Harvard College, Andrew Jackson had a short experience as a teacher in North Carolina, Millard Fillmore was a teacher, and so were Garfield, Blaine and Cleveland.


