U of T to sponsor teach-in on China

TORONTO (CUP)—On the weekend of October 14, 15, and 16 the University of Toronto will host an international conference of crucial importance—the China teach-in.

Branny raps statements made by Tkachuk

"Tkachuk's conclusion that the withdrawal from CUS by the University of Alberta has mercenary undertones is proposterous," says Branny Schepanovich.

Schepanovich, students' council president, was commenting on a statement made last week by U of S Students' Council President, Dave Tkachuk.

Tkachuk had said the withdrawal by the U of A had been connected with a proposed five-cent dues increase.

"Tkachuk is wrong beyond question," said Schepanovich.

"The U of A delegation to the CUS conference in Halifax made every effort to change the trend in CUS policy," he added.

Schepanovich said he was extremely happy that the withdrawal from CUS is causing a re-examination of CUS policy.

Marilyn Pilkington, students' council vice-president, said it is unfortunate that Tkachuk has failed to recognize U of A's stand.

"Tkachuk's comment discredits the reason for the withdrawal from CUS," she said.

The China teach-in will be the first public international conference to bring well-known experts together to discuss these issues.

This year's teach-in is modelled on last year's teach-in on 'Revolution and Response' which was attended by about 20,000 people, and which was viewed or heard on radio or television by close to a million more across the continent.

This year's teach-in is a non-protest adult education project organized by a group of staff and students headed by Professor John M. Robson, of the Department of English at Victoria University.

AIM FOURFOLD

The aim of the teach-in is four-fold: 1. to inform the community about a little known but vastly significant country, 2 to increase Canadian interest in our foreign policy, 3 to lessen the gap between the university and the community, and 4. to create a new bond between students and faculty.

There will be four 2½ hour sessions on October 14-16. CJRT Radio Ryerson will make the proceedings of the sessions available to AM and FM radio stations across the continent on a live radio hook-up.

McGill institutes new liquor regulations

MONTREAL (CUP)—New liquor regulations at McGill University will not require organizations serving liquor at functions to possess both a license to serve and a licence to sell alcohol.

The new regulations are designed to prevent violations of the provincial liquor code being the responsibility of the students' council, says students' society internal vice-president Ian McLean.

Under the present liquor code, alcohol may not be served without a licence. Under no circumstances may liquor be sold to minors.

In future, when an organization plans a function where liquor will be served, it must guarantee that everyone present will be over the minimum legal age of 20 before obtaining a licence to serve from the provincial government.

In addition, the sponsoring organization requires a licence to sell—more difficult to obtain than a serving licence—if it plans to sell the liquor.

These actions were advised by the students' society lawyers in the face of a general tightening of provincial liquor laws.
