The Faculty of Fine Arts is offering the following credit courses in its 1976 Summer Session:

DEPARTMENT OF DANCE

FA/DA 105/205/305/405 Special Dance Studio (Not limited to University Applicants)

Studio classes in modern dance technique; ballet technique; pas de deux and variations; improvisation and composition; modern and ballet repertory; yoga; mime; Spanish dance; jazz; character. (22 hours per week)
Offered in Summer Session Only

In modern and ballet technique class standards range from in-termediate to professional. Students with no dance background will not be accepted except in very special cases. Student selec-tion will be made from questionnaires and class levels will be as-signed on placement day (Switch and Parkers). acement day (Sunday July 4). Total enrolment is

Credit students are required to enrol in three of the classes of-fered, at least one of which should be ballet or modern dance technique (22 hours per week). In the case of students also enrolled in FA/DA 210 or FA/DA 212 some reduction of studio Applicants who are not eligible for university credit may par-cipate on a non-credit basis. Non-credit students who are unable take the full course may be permitted to enrol in fewer classes

FA/DA 210 Dance and Music An investigation of vanguard music in the twentieth century as it might apply to dance composition. Emphasis is placed on the most recent developments in performance, conceptual music-dance, minimalism, and methods of structure, including traditional western notation.

Note: This course is a pre-requisite for FA/DA 310 and is recommended for students entering the teaching or dance notation

FA/DA 212 Non-Western Classic and Folk Dance Forms The course will concentrate on a survey of dances of selected non-western regions using both theoretical and studio approaches. Those influences — historical, political, socio-cultural, and regional — that have shaped and moulded these dances will be studied. Comparative studies of various ethnic dance forms will be made: guest lectures, films, recordings.

FA/DA 217 Introduction to Movement Exploration: The Young Child (Not limited to University Applicants) se children's creative powers.

The programme provides skills, techniques, and personal ex periences through Laban's Approach to Dance in Education which call forth children's intuitive exploration of movement angulare, elemental press and press. which call form children's intuitive exploration of movement language; elemental music making, movement, and language for creative expression and group participation; Creative Drama for children, combining language and movement; and the experience of Personality Assessment through Movement Analysis which fosters better understanding of self and the child.

Participants are introduced to Therapeutic teaching models, active participation in workshops, discussions, and film presen-tations. Teachers of the handicapped or retarded will find this programme helpful for their sensory-motor development

The course is open to beginners but it also serves as an excellent refresher course for professional therapists and teachers involved in creative education.
