If you need aid just call FISH

Not everyone has a friend, neighbor or relative who can lend a hand in an emergency. For that reason, FISH offers 24-hour

assistance to residents of Malton, Brampton and Bramalea.

"The purpose is to act as a good

neighbor by endeavoring to assist anyone who phones for emergency or temporary help," says one of the two Malton co-ordinators for FISH.

FISH is a world-wide organization which began in an Anglican church in England over 20 years ago.

The word FISH comes from the Greek

words which mean Jesus Christ, God's Son Savior. A sketch of a fish was also a symbol of faith used by early Christians. Four years ago, a unit of the non-profit organization opened in Brampton. A year later, Malton joined, followed by Bramalea last vear Out of the 70 volunteer members, 18 are

from Malton.

"We're strictly non-denominational", says one of the Malton co-ordinators who prefers to remain anonymous. "There's no fee. We also respect the confidence of others at all times.

An answering service which covers the three areas is open around the clock for emergency calls.
Although FISH basically an information

service, volunteers also act as listeners for people who just need to talk to someone, and they arrange emergency transporta-tion or accommodation for callers.

"The whole object is to help themselves, but we try to help them when we can in emergency situations," explains the co-ordinator.

Recently, several FISH volunteers back work full-time and, as a result, the Malton branch urgently requires more daytime drivers.
