General Sansom and Reinforcements

In the Fredericton Gleaner of May 31, 1945, General Sansom is quoted as follows:

"On my return to Canada, I submitted my report to the War Committee of the Cabinet but it has not yet been published. I don't think Prime Minister Mackenzie King liked my report any better than he did Colonel Ralston's. I was asked to file a report that would not be too voluminous to be published and did so but it has never been published and I doubt very much if it will be before the election."

The government has now published a summary of the report prepaped by General Sansom himself.

What did his report disclose:

- 1. that the government followed the advice of its military advisers in making provision for reinforcements;
- 2. that Canadian provision for reinforcements was based on British experience until August 31, 1944 when, for the first time, there was enough Canadian experience to guide the army.
- 5. that there was never an over-all shortage of reinforcements, but only a shortage of infantry (as was stated in P.M.'s broadcast of Nov. 8, 1944).
- 4. that the problem disclosed in August was met "as was done in the other Allied Armies by the conversion, or re-mustering, of surplus reinforcements in other Arms".
- 5. that re-mustering was "a practical solution to the problem".
- 6. that the actual numbers of reinforcements despatched from Canada in the calendar year 1944 was 13,816 more than planned.
