Canadian Woman Wins First Place and \$200 From 1,000 Competitors.

Nearly one thousand short stories were submitted in The New York Herald Prize Competition, which closed on February 21. As a whole, they represented a general average of merit that was unusually high. There were few which fell below the acceptable magazine level. There were some which any editor of any magazine would be glad to accept.

They ranged over the entire gamut of human emotions. They represented the tragedy, the comedy, the ro-



MRS. GUY CARLETON JONES.


manace and the melodrama of real life, the horror or the weirdness or the mysticism of the unreal.

All the MSS. were submitted under pseudonyms, according to the terms of the contest. The identification envelopes were opened as soon as the awards had been made.

Mrs. Guy Carleton Jones, winner of the first prize, is one of the best known and most popular society women of Nova Scotia. Her husband, Major Jones, is private secretary to the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia. He has active service in the South African War as officer commanding the Canadian Field Hospital Corps. Her maiden name was Susan Morrow. Her father was the late Robert Morrow of Halifax.

Mrs. Jones has been married some ten years. She has no children. She is bright, vivacious and good looking, an expert horsewoman, a lover of dogs and all outdoor sports, and a favorite in the most exclusive social circles. Her talent for short story writing is shared by her sister, the wife of Major Parker, of the British army, and her sister-in-law, Miss Jones, both of whom are well-known writers of fiction.

Court of Temple of Isis Affair.  
When the mammoth irrigation dam at Assuan, Egypt, was built, a great many things which have since come to pass were not thought of. One of these was the effect upon the low country above of the vast accumulation of water. Had the matter been given any fore consideration it must have been seen that the "backing" of the waters of the Nile would cause damage. That is precisely what has happened to the temple of Isis on the world famous island of Philae.



Philae. The water has inundated the courtyard, until now sightseers visit the place in native boats or dahabehs and some of the finest Egyptian remains extant are covered by the flood. Philae is only 400 yards long, but it has four temples, a long colonnade, several obelisks and a Roman triumphal arch. The island, which is just above the first cataract, is one of the most interesting places in the valley of the storied Nile and has long been a favorite resort of visiting tourists.

Miss Crosby, the Hymn Writer.  
Though she has been blind since she was six weeks old, Miss Frances Jane Crosby, as she is generally called, though her real name is Mrs. Alexander Van Alstyne, has written more than 5,000 hymns, many of them known all over the world. And though she is now eighty-three years old, rather feeble and totally blind, she still travels to evangelistic meetings in various cities and gives readings and lectures. Her home is in Bridgeport, Conn. Among the most famous gospel hymns written by Miss Crosby are those beginning: "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," "Pass Me Not, Oh, Gentle Saviour," "All the Way My Saviour Leads Me" and "I Am Thine, O Lord: I Have Heard Thy Voice."

Save for the heavy green glasses she is compelled to wear, there is little in Miss Crosby's manner while lecturing to indicate her sightlessness. She reads her notes, printed in raised letters, with almost imperceptible movements of her fingers, and turns her head as though glancing about the audience.

"Hymn-writing is my life work," says Miss Crosby, "and I cannot tell you what pleasure I derive from it. I believe I would not live a year if my work were taken from me. A great many people sympathize with me, but although I am grateful to them, I really don't need their sympathy. What would I do with it?"

## INTERCOLONIAL STATEMENT.

The Annual Earnings Have Doubled Since 1895.

Ottawa, May 29.—The Minister of Railways yesterday made his annual statement regarding the business of the Intercolonial Railway for the past year. He submitted to the House a most satisfactory record of progress for the year, showing a surplus of earnings over working expenses of \$60,000.

For the nine months of the current year, ending 31st March, the business of the road continued to increase, and the gross earnings indicated a substantial increase over the corresponding period of the previous year. A comparison of the accounts for last year with those for 1932, the last year of the Conservative Government, disclosed the gratifying fact that in six years the passenger earnings had nearly doubled, and the freight earnings had more than doubled during that period.

A few minutes after the House met this evening the lights went out, and in an instant the chamber and all the corridors were in absolute darkness. It is not uncommon in Ottawa for the incandescent light to go off duty for a longer or shorter period, but this time both the incandescent and also the shaded arc lights went out together. Mr. Haggart, who was speaking, paused, and then resumed his seat. Then the House took half an hour's recess. Candles were brought in, and with one lamp were placed on the table. In the half light thus produced the members sat and smoked while they sang French-Canadian and English songs, until 9 o'clock, when the lights again came on. It was the most pleasant "sing-song" of the session, one of the features being a song and chorus by Hon. Wm. Ross of Victoria, N.S., who was a member of the Mackenzie Administration. The debate on the Intercolonial lasted until after 11, but before midnight a fair amount of money had been voted.

Hon. Mr. Fisher introduced his bill to amend the patent act. In explanation of the measure he stated that decisions of the Supreme Court had rendered necessary certain changes in the law in order to legalize the practice of the patent department. It was also proposed to adopt the British license system with respect to certain clauses of patents. Another radical amendment proposed was that the applications for patents with the accompanying plans be confidential until the patent is granted. Under certain circumstances the period during which the Commissioner of Patents may issue a permit extending the time for manufacture in Canada is also extended. Mr. Fisher gave a detailed statement of the proposed changes in the bill, which are largely of a technical nature, explaining the effect of each change in the present law and practice. The decision of the Supreme Court had, he stated, completely upset the jurisprudence of the patent law and the practice for the past 25 years. The bill was given first reading.

## GUESTS OF TORONTO.

Banquet to the Governor-General and Lady Minto.

Toronto, May 29.—The citizens' banquet to his Excellency the Governor-General and the Countess of Minto at the King Edward Hotel last night was in every particular an entire success. Two hundred guests were assembled. The beautiful banquet hall of the King Edward could not accommodate so large a company, and the tables were laid in the less brilliant though no less handsome American dining-room on the first floor, where the Yacht Club ball was held. There were but three toasts—the King, his Excellency and Lady Minto, and the Empire; three speakers—Mayor Urquhart, his Excellency, and Hon. Geo. W. Ross—and the banquet concluded at 11.30 with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne." The Mayor delivered a short and eloquent eulogy of the vice-regal guests. His Excellency's speech was a brief, simple and direct acknowledgment of the kindness of the citizens and praise of the city. Premier Ross was evidently in fine fettle; his speech was thoughtful and eloquent, was often punctuated by applause, and the conclusion roused the company to a vociferous outburst of cheering.
