A communication was received from A. H. MacNeill. K. C., acting on behalf of clients, asking for payment of fees of witnesses called for the prosecution. The aggregate of these fees was \$121. This makes a total of \$388 which the city is already asked to pay, and the solicitor for the prosecution has not yet put in his accoun There was an animated discussion on the subject, but this was to a large ex-

tent free from acrimony.

In the private session of the finance committee prior to the council meeting, the members voted to put the two accounts in the committee's report for andorsation by council. When the reort came up in council, Alderman Daniel urged that the items in question be ated, and moved, with Alderman Talbot, that the accounts be referred to the city solicitor for a written opinion. Alderman Daniel stated that as the expenditure had never been authorized the council he could not see how the board could legally pass it, and he desired to have every alderman and the mayor on record in the premises. was his intention to be absolutely fair. end he therefore gave notice that every elderman voting for the payment of the accounts would be held personally rensible for the sum in issue. He believed the city would get accounts aggregating \$1000 before the matter was concluded, and his advice from a legal source was that the corporation could not be held liable. Moreover, the ratepayers would not stand for such busiress; aldermen were paid to pass on such matters, and if they were not to be given an opportunity to exercise judgment the council might be disrensed with altogether and their sal-

pries saved to the corporation. Alderman Embleton wanted the city solicitor's opinion, remarking that City Seliciter Nelson had told him it was up to the council to pay these disputed bills although the mayor had exceeded his authority in incurring the liability.

THE SOLICITOR'S VIEWS.

Mr. Nelson having been requested by the chair to express his sentiments, ad-dressed a brief lecture on the ethics of favor either visiting Spokane or having Blackstone on points such as were in dispute at this juncture. He said that under the statute the mayor certainly should have consulted the council befor hiring the Spokane sleuth, but even as the chief magistrate didn't do so the liability remained and in his opinion the city would have to settle the bill.
