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GUELPH FATTENED UP THEIR BATTING AVERAGES AGAIN

Lill, Clermont and Gero Being Touched for 16 Safe Drives and Are Held Responsible for Red Sox 11-5 Defeat.

The Guelph team made another runaway of the game yesterday and had no difficulty whatever in defeating the locals, the score being 11-5. It was another tame affair, almost a repetition of the day before. Lill started in to pitch for Brantford and the Leafs went right after him and scored 4 runs before the hand full of spectators realized the game had started. He was replaced by Clermont who pitched good ball for a few innings and then he went to the wall. Gero was then called upon to do the firing and he did little or no better than his predecessors. The Guelph batters had another field day fattening up their batting averages at the expense of the Brantford twirlers. It seems the farther the Red Sox go the worse they get and they certainly are a lame excuse for a ball team. The locals presented a different fielding trio than the one that occupied the outfield gardens on the previous day. John Novak who played third base here part of last season was in centre field. Rowe in right and Coose in left. It was not the fault of the fielders so much that the Royals secured the eleven runs as the pitchers who seemed to pitch the ball right where the Guelph players wanted it, and they certainly landed on the ball, securing no less than 16 hits.

Dick Tasker of last year's team was in uniform and managed to get into the line-up by making a bunt on the bases. Guelph scored 4 runs in the first, 3 in the seventh and 4 in the eighth. The Red Sox managed to get two men across the plate in the fifth and 3 in the eighth. The spectators in the stand took their medicine good naturedly, and looked upon the affair as a joke. The spectators had their "outing" in the 8th and some of them had a good laugh at Dick Tasker. In this spasm Coose and Nelson singled. Lamond cracked out a three base hit, scoring the pair. Rowe died at first. Gero bunted safe and "Matty" scored. Behan's error gave Novak a life. Wagner flew out. Gero stole second.
