Wagner went into that July 19 combat as a despised substitute. He emerged wearing the halo of greatness. He cost the Louisville club a few hundred dollars, and by his own wonderful playing, drew into the turnstile close to \$1,000,000 over the span of 29 years. It was the playing of Wagner that was the real factor in swinging three pennants to Pittsburgh; the greatness of this one man that kept the Pirates in the fight for so many years; the love and esteem for this low-legged German still brings crowds to see the Pirates, although long ago they ceased being bunting chasers.

On Aug. 25, 1897, the regular second baseman of the Louisville club was injured.

"Do you think you can play second?" asked Wagner's manager.

"I'll try—and I'll do the best I can." was the modest reply.

The Last Mobician

Since that day Wagner has played every position on the diamond. Once in an emergency, in the earlier days, he pitched a game—and won it. On several other occasions he went behind the bat. He played second frequently, was a star at first, oftentimes at third and in the garden. But it was at short that he rose to the supreme; it was there that he peered brilliantly for a while—and then faded and died from major league play. Lajoie, Leach, Clarke, Brown and others, have gone. Wagner alone remains. The stout-hearted, wonderful, lovable man alone has survived the 20-year Father

WAGNER PASSES

43RD BIRTHDAY

Grand Old Man of the Pittsburgh Pirates Has Been 20 Years in Big Leagues

HE IS A LANDMARK

Standing Head and Shoulders Above All Others of His Day

The "rookie" was none other than John Henry (Honus) Wagner, who celebrated his 43rd birthday Saturday noon of yesterday at the home since he has been ranked by many as the greatest all-around player of all time.

From the moment Wagner made his big league debut he was a star. That first game stamped him as a fine fielder, a powerless, fearless batsman, and despite his apparent awkwardness, a superb base runner.

In his first game—it was against Washington—Wagner had a perfect day as a gardener, making two put-outs and one assist. At bat he amassed a 500 average by shooting out a single and a sacrifice in three times up.

Made Sensational Start

Wagner got away to a sensational start. He hit safely in each of his first nine games, smashing out 14 safeties in 33 times up, an average of .424, before he was halted by Bill Kennedy. He scored his first run on July 20, his first two-bagger on July 21, and his first triple on July 22. The first of the 100 home runs that Wagner made during his 20 years as a big leaguer, was driven out on August 14, 1916, in 33 times up, by shooting out a single and a sacrifice in three times up.

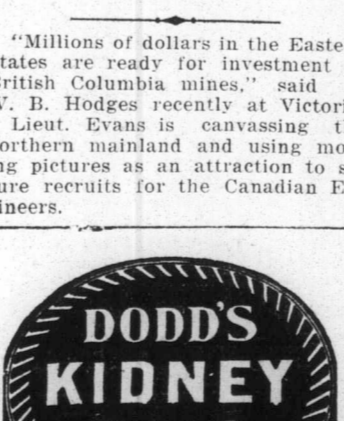
