INCREASED SALARIES By Courier Leased Wire. Montreal, Oct. 17.—Increased salaries are to be paid to the teachers in the Catholic schools under the authority of the central board of Catholic school commissioners, but the amounts have not yet been definitely decided. Commissioner Perrault has a motion on the order paper to establish the minimum salary of married teachers at \$1,000; of lay single teachers at \$900, of teaching brothers at \$500 instead of \$450; lay women teachers \$300; \$700 and \$800 state the extent of the robbery.
