FAIR NOTES—Continued.
 The firm of Gordon & Halliday, woolen manufacturers, Athens, made a very creditable display of cloths, flannels, yarns &c. The firm has made considerable progress in the manufacture of all kinds of woolen goods during the past two years and are now able to compete with any of the large factories in their lines. The transportation of their goods to the fair was carried off the honor of taking more prizes than any other exhibitor. He received 27 first, second and 5 third prize tickets and he makes the boast that he does not need to bring old staff to capture prizes as every article was the product or manufacture of 1890.

Those Davies of Spring Valley, was to the front with his fine herd of Holsteins. He captured 6 first prizes in the different sections.
 John Kester of Greenbush, was a large exhibitor of colts, Jersey cattle, swine and poultry. He took 1st on 3 year old colt in harness, 1st on Jersey bull, 1st on Berkshire boar, and 1st prize on poultry.
 Murray & Son, Brockville, made a very fine exhibit of oil paintings &c. Although there was keen competition they succeeded in carrying off five first prizes and one second.
 John Bellow, Brockville, deserves special mention as an exhibitor of fowl. He had a large collection of choice animals and took 11 first, 3 second and 3 third prizes.
 Jas. Neilson, Lyn, was a large exhibitor of sheep and got 1 first, and 3 second prizes on Oxford Downs.

John Imerson, Harlem, swept the board on grade sheep, getting 1st on every variety in which he competed, as well as capturing the pen prize.
 A gentleman from across the border, who is a sporting man, one who keeps a good horse and knows one when he sees it, told our representative that he had been to seven state fairs and a large majority of the principal fairs of northern New York, and he never saw a larger or better lot of horses (including mares and colts) at any fair he had ever visited.

THE DELTA FAIR.
 Fine Weather—A Good Exhibit and an Immense Crowd at the Popular County Fair.
 A Reporter representative visited the Delta fair on Thursday, the last day of the exhibition. The B. & W. took a good sized crowd from Brockville, Lyn and Athens. On enquiry we learned that the number who took part in the exhibition on Wednesday outside of the regular exhibitors, was very small. A hasty run through the building and grounds convinced us that while the animals and articles were on the whole better than last season the number of exhibits was numerically less. The cattle stalls were well filled with a fine class of cattle. The centre of attraction in the cattle class was the Jerseys, which from remarks made by spectators was universally conceded to be the cow of the future. Albert D. DeLong, of Elgin, had two cows 5 years old and a bull calf which took the highest honors in the class. The calf is a registered thoroughbred for which Mr. DeLong paid a handsome price a few weeks ago. He is a beauty and destined to make a good record not only in the yard but at exhibitions as well. Lucius Stevens of Delta was also an exhibitor in this class, showing some very fine animals which he claims are 11-16 Jersey. There was a fair show of sheep. The Downs were the favorite, R. G. Murphy, Elgin, carrying off nearly all the first honors in this class. Swine was not largely represented, the Yorkshires exhibited by R. G. Murphy drawing the most attention. The poultry exhibit was small, Clifford Keeler of Greenbush being the principal exhibitor. In the halls the show of domestic manufactures was smaller than usual. The grain and roots were fine in quality but small in quantity. The display of butter, cheese, honey etc., was fair. Apples, grapes and vegetables were good. The directors had a small room partitioned off from the root department in which was displayed the special prizes given by friends of the society. The "white plug" given by Colledge was placed on the head of the good looking director from Newboro, and it said that he created a very favorable impression on the minds of some of the ladies, who had come quite a distance expecting to see this lot on the head of Brockville's chief magistrate. Some of the knowing ones pointed out the genial Billy to a certain lady in the crowd as his, but she could not be fooled that way, as she had seen the Mayor's footprints in the snow on a certain memorable occasion when he assisted to break track for a B. & W. engine on the road near Lyn. This hat was subsequently won by the Athens postmaster, who, with a feeling of liberality donated it to a leading sport at the fair. Strange to relate this same hat was found in the Athens livery stable the next morning, where it now graces a peg in the hostlers' sanctum. In the horse ring the stand-off was some very fine animals being exhibited, but the quantity or quality could in no way compare with the exhibit at Unionville. The races attracted considerable attention. The winner of the first race was J. C. Rydyk, with Prince second. The three minute race failed to materialize on the second day. The following horses were entered for the free-for-all: Frank L. Billy Johnston, Belle Wilson, and Nettie C. Frank L. took three straight heats, the others came in as placed above. The official time given by Mr. B. B. Airey was 48, 49 and 47. Those who claim to know say the track is nearly 14 rods over a mile in three rounds. The entries numbered 1842 and the gate receipts over \$600. Everything on the grounds was conducted in first class order and every person holding any position of trust was obliging and painstaking towards exhibitors and visitors. The B. & W. managers did everything to accommodate passengers, with the facilities at their disposal, and everybody seemed satisfied with the accommodation. On the return trip, the regular train from Brockville crossed the excursion train at Lyndhurst crossing, the extra train being backed down into the gravel pit. This track had not been used for some months and was partially overgrown with grass and weeds. This rendered the brakes useless and the rear car plunged into a sand bank, from which it took all hands nearly half an hour to extricate the train.
