The prospectus of the Atlantic Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, just issued by the brokers, Messrs. Sutherland & Cameron, Ottawa, contains some interesting reading matter. The properties and limits acquired by the company contain about 302 square miles. The company has reports on the property, made by five different rangers, whose reports show that there is sufficient wood to afford a perpetual supply of timber. One of the rangers, who has travelled and examined limits in the State of Maine, New Brunswick and Quebec and worked in Wisconsin and Minnesota, says it is his best pulp limit he has ever seen or travelled.

The water which will be used in the manufacture of paper is pure and clean, the Little Cascapedia River being fed by springs and is suitable for making the finest grades of paper without the expense of filtering.

Wardrope, director the New Richmond Lumber Company, Limited, Montreal; William M. McIntyre, paper manufacturer (late mechanical superintendent Laurentide Pulp Company), and W. R. P. Parker, barrister-at-law, Toronto.
