Naauwpoort, Dec. 29.—Gen. Delisle has severely defeated Hertzog's commando eighteen miles west of De Aar, and has driven them towards Prieska. He captured a number of waggons, and released the Cape police who were captured at Phillipstown. Gen. Grenfell has turned back Kritzinger's commando toward Venterstad. Both sections of the raiders are in a desperate plight, and it is probable that they will never be able to return to the Orange River Colonies.

They have received little accession in strength from colonial Dutch. The invasion will probably be a complete failure. It is held here that the rapid movement of British forces, which has brought about this result reflects the greatest credit on the army.

A CASE OF MURDER.

Smithfield, Dec. 29.—There are well Smithfield, Dec. 29.—There are well-founded rumors that a lieutenant of police at Dewetsdorp has been shot. He was taken prisoner with the garrison. He had previously carried out orders to deport women who were openly fomenting rebellion. There were some relatives of Commandant Pretorius among the women so deported. On his arrival at Dewetsdorp Pretorius expressed the greatest indignation ported. On his arrival at Dewetsdorp Fre-torius expressed the greatest indignation, and asked De Wet for permission to take charge of the prisoner himself. From the evidence of natives and others, it appears that Pretorius treated the prisoner with great rigour, and it is considered quite pos-sible that murder was really committed.
