Mr. E. G. Taylor, local inspector of fisheries calls the attention of fishermen in Nanaimo waters to the Dominion regulations governing the taking and exporting for sale of salmon. The inspector states that salmon weighing about 21 or 23 lbs are commonly sold in Nanaimo markets, and the public appear unaware of any rules as to the size of the fish they may buy. The rule is that no one is allowed to sell or buy any salmon under the weight of 2 1/2 lbs. undressed, and anyone buying fish under the weight is liable to a fine.
