

DARDANELLES ABLAZE WITH BOMBS

GERMAN POST CAPTURED IN EASY MANNER

Tibali, Capital of Kamerun, in West Africa, Taken by an Allied Surprise Party.

THE GERMANS RETREATED IN GREAT DISORDER

The Northern Part of Kamerun Now Almost Entirely Cleared of the Germans.

Paris, Nov. 22.—Official announcement was made today of the capture by French and British forces of the city of Tibali, in the German colony of Kamerun, West Africa, as the result of a surprise attack. The statement follows:

"A French column, operating in Kamerun, commanded by Lieut. Col. Blaisot, surprised the German forces on November 3rd. The Germans, who were entrenched on the heights in the region of Tibali, were defeated, and retreated in great disorder.

"The Germans were expecting an attack from the north, whereas the French, by a rapid detour, made an attack from the south.

"On the next day a British column joined with the French in the occupation of Tibali, the great native city, whose Sultan and population welcomed the Franco-British forces, saving them from oppressive German rule."

Advices received here from Cape Town show that with the opening of the dry season there has been a renewal of activity on the part of the forces operating against the Germans in the Kamerun. Great difficulties have been encountered during the wet season, although it is reported that the Germans are being hemmed in gradually from all sides. The German headquarters are at Jaunde, where the Governor General has a strong force with abundant artillery and formidable entrenchments.

The northern area of Kamerun has been cleared of the Germans with the exception of Mora. From the east the French, under General Caniffie, have been pursuing a vigorous offensive. From the west important British

NO PARTICULAR SECTS INVITED

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Sir Joseph Pope asked for a statement today regarding the protest attributed to the Evangelical Alliance of Halifax, that only Anglican and Catholic dignitaries were invited to the state funeral of Sir Chas. Tupper, absolutely refuted the story. "I had not heard of the protest in question," said Sir Joseph Pope, who had charge of the funeral arrangements, "but as a matter of fact I fully recognize the principle involved. I

could not invite all the clergy, but I did invite the Rev. H. R. Grant, Moderator of the Presbyterian Synod, and Rev. W. J. Croft, President of the Nova Scotia Methodist Conference, and both attended. Rev. H. T. Dewolf, President of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, and Rev. Dr. Aitken, President of Acadia University were also invited, but sent notes regretting their inability to attend."

Sir Joseph made it quite clear that there was neither attempt nor desire to limit the official invitation to any particular sects. He added: "I invited only one Roman Catholic clergyman other than the Archbishop. If I invited a large number of Anglicans it was because the funeral was conducted by Anglicans to an Anglican church and to an Anglican cemetery."

They agree with the British representative that no papers were aboard the ship to show her nationality, but were in the American consulate ashore.
