## CANADIAN NATIONAL TELEGRAPH SYSTEM

Offices and Equipment of Western Union in British Columbia Taken Over.

(Special Despatch to The Daily Gleaner.)

Montreal, Aug. 30.—With a view of rounding out its All Canadian Telegraph Service from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast, the Canadian National Telegraphs have taken over, effective September 1st, the offices, equipment and properties in British Columbia owned by the Western Union Telegraph Company and operated by it under the name of the Great North Western Telegraph Company. The important offices added to the Canadian National Telegraphs list through this acquisition are Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster. This means that it is now possible to send telegrams over the Canadian National Telegraphs to these Pacific coast points without the necessity of transferring to another company. The deal involves a considerable amount of equipment and fixtures; it also includes sixteen miles of pole line and wires from the boundary of the State of Washington to the City of Vancouver, and a cable from a point in Washington to Victoria, which includes 15,000 feet of land wires and 116,000 feet of submarine cable.

## PRINCE WAS WARMLY GREETED AT PIER

Smilingly Tells a Newspaper Woman He is Not Engaged.

New York, Aug. 29.—Edward Prince of Wales arrived to-day. Three airplanes hovered over his ship while thousands of persons ashore and on small boats around the Beargaria strained their eyes for a sight of the distinguished young Englishman who is making his second visit to the United States. The Prince was completely surrounded by newspaper correspondents and reception committee members. Smiling and slightly diffident such was the warmth and enthusiasm of his reception. His Royal Highness spoke to the 75 reporters gathered on the starboard side of the dock. He shook hands with a few of them and in response to a few formal questions made a hasty search through his pockets for his written statement. Finally turning to Major Solbert, his American aide, he said: "I've got a written statement somewhere; where is it?"

While the statement was being found more queries from the journalistic group and the Prince replying said: "I'm happy to be in America. I like your country very much. The fact that I came over here for a holiday is the best I can say in that direction."

A young woman pressed forward and put the inevitable question as to the Prince's possible marriage.

"No, I'm not engaged," replied His Royal Highness, smiling tolerantly.

"Would you marry an American girl if you fell in love with one?" said the redoubtable lady.

The Prince smiled again but did not reply. He explained that inasmuch as he had crossed the seas on a holiday he hoped the newspapermen would make matters as easy as possible for him.

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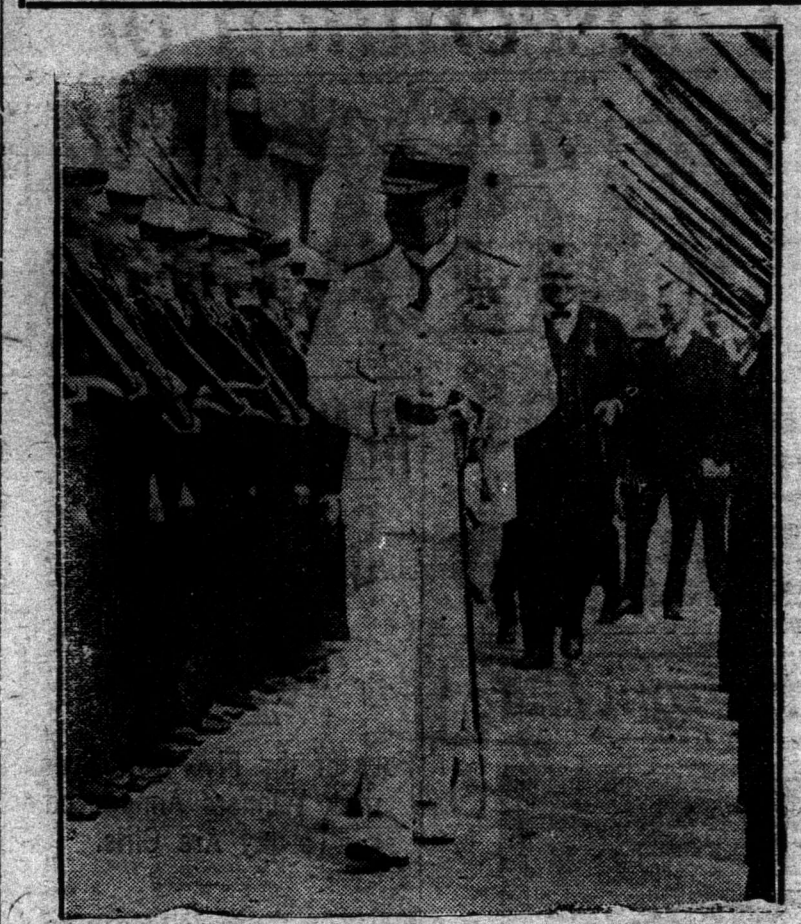
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## Reviewed Naval Cadets

## GERMANS UTILIZE SWARM OF LOCUSTS

Bocholt, Germany, Aug. 30.—A plague of locusts has brought a new industry to this region where the insects have been gathered by the ton and oil extracted from their bodies. The locusts came over the frontier from Holland, by countless billions, and were caught by women and boys with great baskets.

The oil is intended for airplane motors and is said to be particularly adapted for winter flying because it does not congeal in low temperatures. Good, fat locusts retailed at about one-fourth of a cent a pound. After the insects passed through the oil extraction process the refuse was used as fertilizer.

## FATAL ACCIDENT.

Antigonish, N. S., Aug. 28.—Mrs. Thomas Macdonald, of Cape George Point, was killed last night when the horse she was driving took fright when descending a steep hill, bolted and threw her from the vehicle over a steep bank. She landed on her head, sustaining a fractured skull from which she died in a few minutes. Her nephew, Colin McNeill, who was with her at the time, suffered a fractured jaw and severe bruises and was removed to hospital.

Five weeks ago Harry Byer, in bathing in French Creek, Franklin, Penn., lost a \$500 diamond ring among the stones near the shore. Then followed a week's search by a special man on the job. 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## BELCOURT SIGNS ON BEHALF OF CANADA

London, Aug. 29.—Senator N. A. Belcourt, on behalf of Canada, today signed the protocol and the agreements annexed thereto which were negotiated at the recent International Conference in London on German reparations.

Senator Belcourt will sail for Canada to-morrow from Southampton on the steamship Empress of France.

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## BRITISH SETTLERS FOR THE MARITIMES

3,000 Families Expected Soon—Each to Receive Loan of \$1,500.

(Special Despatch to The Daily Gleaner.)

Quebec, Aug. 30.—British settlers in Canada will in future be assured of a grant of \$1,500 with which to purchase farm implements and other requirements for the establishment of Canadian farms, as a result of an agreement recently concluded with the British Overseas Settlement Board and Hon. J. A. Robb, Canadian Minister of Immigration and Acting Minister of Finance.

This important announcement was made yesterday by Hon. Mr. Robb on his arrival at Quebec on the Canadian Pacific steamer Montrose. The new arrangement between the governments concerned will be applicable immediately to the 3,000 British families who are expected to be sent out to this country in the near future.

By the agreement, the Canadian Government undertakes to purchase a number of farms in the Maritime Provinces and the British Government is to give each settling family the sum of \$1,500 for the above-mentioned purpose, which will be payable in 25 years at an interest rate of 5 per cent.

The choice of suitable immigrants will be made by the British Government. Hon. Mr. Robb said that he thought the agreement would assure for Canada settlers of the highest type, who would take full advantage of the opportunity this country offers.
