## HAWAII, THE "PEARL OF THE PACIFIC."

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Among the other schemes to replenish  
the depleted treasury of the queen was  
what is known as the lottery. The origi-  
nator of this was Mr. Thomas E. Evans,  
whose wife was a maid of honor to the  
queen, and who had held some offices  
under the king.

After the Louisiana Lottery had been  
drawn out of the United States, its back-  
ers and supporters began to look about  
for some place convenient to America  
where the gigantic windmill might be re-  
suscitated. The Hawaiian Islands, where
