Ancient time-keeping has received new light from two remarkable stones lately unearthed by the German explorers on the site of the old Ionic port of Miletus. These stones are the remains of calendars, of which one is shown to date from 109 A.D. The year was divided into twelve zodiacal signs, and against each month the motion of the remaining signs was given, with a note predicting the weather. On the left side were thirty holes, a wooden pegbeing moved forward one hole each day, thus giving the astronomical date. This new find has made clear the meaning of parapegma, or pegthe meaning of parapegma, or peg-calendar, a name by which other stones have been rather mysteriously known.
