

THE facilities for handling outward bound passengers at at the Canadian Pacific dock at Liverpool, England, are as perfect and speedy as any in the world. As will be seen from the picture above of future Canadian citizens boarding the "Montcalm", the travellers pass from the street and railway station levels to waiting rooms on the dock side, and crossing the bridged wharf, board the ship by the sileon deck where they are received and assigned to quarters. Their baggage is handled from beloweand with despatch.
