

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

Mr. Gaudin's first spot in the house of commons on May 17th, 1833, fifty-five years ago.

Howard Park has resigned the editorship of the Herald. He will retire from active journalism and engage in literary work.

The sailing ship of Mr. John Barlow, Wellington, was totally destroyed by fire on Thursday. The loss is about \$2,000, with no insurance.

An earthquake shock, lasting five seconds, was felt at Ullswater Point, in the suburbs of Ottawa, on the night of the 20th ult. Houses rocked and dishes rattled.

Nineteen Chinamen arrived at Halifax, Saturday, in a boat, having come from China via the C.P.R. They were bound for Havana, where they will work on a plantation.

R. B. Norton & Co. have had the front of their establishment beautifully painted and decorated. The job is a good one and presents a fine appearance. Messrs Norton & Co. were the artists.

Former fires in Cumberland county N.S. have caused immense damage. Thousands of dollars worth of timber, grain and other growing crops have been destroyed. Several buildings were also swept away.

Rev. Father Savage, who has been appointed curate of St. Dunstan's church, Fredericton, leaves for the capital. Rev. Father Corbett succeeds Father Savage as curate at St. John the Baptist church, St. John's.

The barn and outbuildings of Mr. John Glover, Kensington, were destroyed by fire last Wednesday morning. Nearly all his second hay and other contents housed in the buildings were also destroyed. It is thought the buildings were fired by a spark from a passing train.

Two judicial fires took place at St. John's, Thursday. The first was at the railway station, where the platform in front was destroyed in a blaze, and the other at the residence of Mr. L. E. Shaw, watchmaker. Both were extinguished before doing any considerable damage.

THE MEDICAL ASSOCIATION of the Province held its annual session at Summerside last Wednesday and Thursday. Papers were read by Dr. McNeill, St. John's; Dr. Taylor, Charlottetown; and Dr. McLaughlin, Summerside. Dr. Conroy, of this city, was elected President. The Association meets in this city next 7:30.

Thursday morning Rev. Ronald McGillivray, P.P. of Arnscliffe, Antigonish, N.S., went to bathe near the pier there, and about two hours afterwards his dead body was found. It is probable he was seized by cramps, and as he could not swim was drowned in the few feet of water. He was a brother of the late Rev. Alex. McGillivray, who died in this city some years ago.

Mr. Dockyard came to the city to attend the usual market, and just previous to going into Morris' place had finished some business in W. F. Carter's restaurant adjoining. Medical aid was immediately summoned, but the unfortunate man was beyond his power. Heart failure was the cause of his death. Mr. Dockyard was aged 45 years, unmarried, and well known throughout the Province, being the owner of the famous trotting stallion Black Pilot.

THE Jacques Cartier, the steamer purchased by the Island Steam Navigation Co. to replace the Heather Belle arrived here from Quebec, Sunday forenoon. The Cartier is a side wheel steamer, about 100 tons in build to the Heather Belle, but having more convenient accommodations for both freight and passengers. Her dimensions are length 147 feet, beam 25 feet, depth 7 feet. She has a gross tonnage of 120 tons, and a net tonnage of 100 tons. The steamer is a fine little craft and will undoubtedly fully meet the requirements of the route. Her passenger accommodations are especially good. Twelve comfortable staterooms are on all decks, and the general appearance of the vessel will prove appealing to the comfort of the traveler.
