MARSHALL KILLED IN OLD KENTUCK

Miners Baricaded Themselves and Resisted Service of Papers by Officers and posse.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 25.—Deputy
United States Marshal Moringall was
killed and five members of his posse
and six miners were seriously wound-
ed in a riot this afternoon, by the min-
ers at the R. L. Stearns company min-
ing camp, a short distance from Som-
ersville. The big hotel at Stearns in
which the federal officers had taken
up their quarters was surrounded by
the company and in danger of being
burned. The trouble between the
miners and marshal was caused by
the efforts of the marshal to serve an
injunction on 20 miners to prevent
them from interfering with a number
of employees of the mine. The men
had been on strike for some time. An
application was made to Federal Judge
Cochran for an injunction to prevent
the miners from interfering with other
employees of the mine and the mar-
shal's posse. The miners refused to
obey and they were surrounded and
fired upon. The federal officers were
forced to retreat and the mine was
burned. The riot was the most serious
in the history of the state since the
Civil War.
