Plaindealer Falsifies the Record.

On Saturday we intimated that we proposed to prove that the Plaindealer man had wilfully falsified facts and other evidence to corroborate his charge that a compact had been made last January between the Liberal Party and Coaker. We proceeded to do so. It will be observed in the first place that he makes the editor of the Evening Telegram a party to the transaction. We have already stated that no compact is in existence and that no compact has ever been in existence, and that all allegations as to submission of terms last January, of counter-terms agreed to, particulars as to terms and conditions of secrecy are falsehoods. In this connection the Plaindealer avers that Mr. Coaker admitted that a compact had been made and was in existence in a letter which was published in the Evening Telegram, and to buttress up this, the Plaindealer states that "Lloyd" was also roasted for letting Coaker's blunder pass, but it appears that the Editor was not present when the silly letter was handed in, and did not see it in proof.

The whole of this is a tissue of falsehoods, the letter under reference contains no statement, express or implied, that such a compact was in existence or had been in existence. There was nothing for which to "roast" Lloyd, nor was any "roasting"

given to Lloyd. No excuse was offered by Lloyd as no complaint was made. Lloyd was present when the letter was handed in. Lloyd had it "set up." Lloyd did see the proof, and Lloyd published it. And why not? Instead of any "trick" being "given away," the words Mr. Coaker used are direct evidence that no such compact was in existence. Here are the words:

"The Government's conduct towards the F. P. U. during the last three years and their management of public affairs, especially regarding land grabbing and general extravagance, is sufficient to invite the F. P. U. to consider the advisability of inviting Sir R. Bond to become their political leader and thereby place themselves in the position to meet such attacks as those encountered in to-day's News and Chronicle."

Instead, therefore, of giving away any secret of an alleged compact, the last January the words of Mr. Coaker make it patent that there was no compact on March 13th, some two months after the compact was alleged to be made. How could a compact be in existence to the effect that Sir Robert Bond was to lead the Union forces two months before the time the President intimates that it may be advisable to consider the question of inviting Sir Robert Bond to lead?

In a second letter, on March 15th in the Evening Telegram, the President of the F. P. U. repeats the words we have cited, and states in addition:

"I have no idea as to whether Sir Robert Bond would entertain such a proposal. But if such an arrangement comes about, the Government have no one to blame but themselves and their own conduct. The attempt made by the Tory party and the Tory press to destroy the influence of the Fishermen's Union, its leader and its organ, the letter of Mr. Morrison to the News and Chronicle on the Libel Suits, the attacks on the F. P. U. demonstration and mass meetings by the Government organs and heebers, afford ample ground for the F. P. U. to take up the matter. The President, however, has no authority to make any coalition, but he has a right to submit any suggestion to the Council for decision. I venture to assert that if a coalition was agreed to between the Union and the Liberal Party that the question of what would become of the present Government would be a foregone conclusion."

These extracts from the second letter makes it clear that no compact had been made in January last, for on March 15th Mr. Coaker states:—(1) He does not know whether Sir Robert Bond would entertain such a proposal; (2) He as President has no authority to make any compact, but he has the right to suggest it to the Council.

Yet in face of the letters themselves, in face of Mr. Coaker's words, which exclude absolutely any suggestion that a compact was in existence, the Plaindealer wilfully and falsely states that Coaker in one of these letters had given the "trick" away and states that Coaker had excused the making of the compact on the ground that the "extraneousness of the Government MADE it necessary to consider the advisability of calling in

Sir Robert Bond to lead the Union Party."

These words are quoted by the Plaindealer as if they were actually the text of the letters of the 13th or 15th of March. The words are not to be found there. The words are manufactured to make it appear that Coaker referred to the compact as completed and perfected before the date in question, whereas he is referring to a coalition as a possibility of the future, which it may be desirable to take up and to take up in the future.

This is a deliberate falsification of the words of the letters we have under reference. Coaker did not use the words attributed to him. The words he used in the letters of March 13th and 15th we have quoted, and they completely and conclusively prove the contrary to the allegation attributed to him by a wilful falsification and deliberate misquotation of his words. In no way did he admit that a compact was in existence. He could not do so, as there was no compact. The whole tenor of the two letters, as well as the words cited by us, contradict plainly the wilful misrepresentation of the Plaindealer.

A writer must be reduced to a pitiful plight when he not only lets his imagination run riot, but deliberately perverts facts and falsifies quotations in order to affirm the wild fancies of a disordered imagination.
