## RECEIPT FOR MAKING GOOD BREAD.

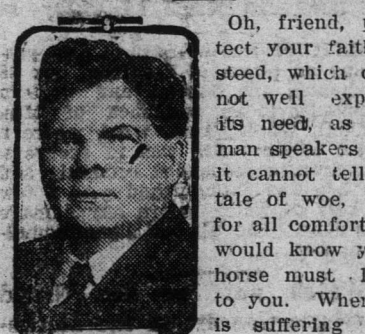
## JAP CRUISERS ON THE COAST OF PERU.

Lima, Peru, Jan. 12.—Japanese cruisers continue to be active along the coast of Peru, seeking the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich.

The latest reports received here set forth that the Japanese armored cruiser Asama went into the port of Payta, Peru, yesterday, took on provisions, and left the same afternoon. There is reason to believe that the British steamer Oriana, on her way back to Liverpool from the Pacific Coast of South America, was being sought by the German boat. In any event, it is apparent that Japanese cruisers are endeavoring to come up with the Prinz Eitel Friedrich.

## Hockey Season Opened Last Night

FEILDIAVS DEFEAT VICTORIAS IN LIVELY GAME BY NINE GOALS TO SEVEN—A LARGE ATTENDANCE.

With probably the youngest aggregation that ever occupied positions on League Hockey ice, the Feildians won a decided victory over the Victorias at the Prince's Rink last evening, after what may be termed a hard fought battle. It was the initial game for the season and a crowded gathering witnessed it. The exhibition summarized was, to say the least, up to the mark for two local teams. Much enthusiasm prevailed amongst the spectators and as the game went on the fans cheered their favorite side loud and long. At 7:30 the teams were called to the arena by Referee Pincent and lined up in this order:

## THE GAME.

At 7:40 the puck was put in motion. The Victorias opened with a slight spurt, retailed by the Feildians. The Vics again became aggressive, but were driven back equally as effectively as before. For the next few minutes the Vics continued hostilities, but their efforts went for naught, owing to the off-side play of their right wing man. Suddenly F. Jerrett, the Feildian cover, who, as was generally conceded last night, has to be looked forward to as a "star," broke away and went in Vics territory, chased by Munn, who fouled and was put in the penalty box. Play then became fast and furious, the Vics resuming the aggressive and having the best of it. During a scrimmage at the mouth of the Feildian goal Nix Hunt, in the excitement, threw the puck in the net, drawing first blood for the Vics. On re-centering, Munn and Lilly combined and scored the second goal for their team. The Feildians were not discouraged and thinking it time to get a share of what was going on, F. Jerrett captured the disc, and after a brilliant exhibition of individual play, landed the first goal, followed by No. 3 being recorded for the Vics, through Lilly. After that the College boys worked with renewed vim and determination and for several minutes afterwards controlled the puck. Then they got in some of that pretty combination work for which they are noted, with the result that E. Jerrett netted No. 2 and Tommy Payne Nos. 3 and 4. Soon after Munn and Lilly scored a goal each for the Vics, putting them one in the lead again, but just before the half time bell sounded Payne notched up the equalizer for the Feildians, though they had only five men on the ice, as H. Munn and E. Jerrett were occupying the seat of repentance for forgetting the rules.

## SECOND PERIOD.

During this half much better stuff was served out to the onlookers even though the play at times was not suited for a ball-room. The Vics started to attack and were repulsed. E. Jerrett and H. Munn who had just been liberated from fence confinement, got in some brilliant work and succeeded in recording No. 6 and before the Vics had time to change their mind the same couple again beat Hunt—No. 7. A fast exhibition followed, honors being about evenly divided. Munn and Sinnot each scored a goal for the Vics, again balancing the tally for the last time. In a scrimmage, White got a blow in the face, and Referee Pincent removed the man who did it from the ice for three minutes. Sinnot and Munn also got penalized in turn. Play then became of a give-and-take nature and Lilly got a "speck" in the nose and had to go on dock for repairs. The game resumed briskly. Payne got away and landed No. 8 and about 20 seconds before the final gong sounded sent in the 9th. Mr. E. Pincent refereed; timekeepers, Messrs. C. J. Ellis and J. Carmichael; penalty, Mr. N. J. Vinnicombe.

Having no home to go to, a man named Frank Meaney, aged about 35 years, slept on the street all Sunday night and yesterday morning was found with both feet badly frostbitten and other portions of his body numb with the cold and now lies at the General Hospital.

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning people in the neighborhood of Tank Lane noticed a man crawling on his hands and knees across the street. He had come from underneath a gallery at the rear of Ayre's store and was endeavouring to reach one of the dwelling houses on the opposite side of the street. Though in an advanced state of exhaustion, the unfortunate man was able to speak a little and told his sad circumstances and how he spent Sunday night. He was sparsely clad, and the wonder is that he did not perish. Const. Forsey, who was doing duty on New Gower Street, was informed of the case, and visited the place. On finding that Meaney was unable to stand at all the officer procured a sleigh and drove him to the police station where Superintendent Grimes, after examining the case, communicated with the hospital where Meaney was hurriedly conveyed for immediate treatment.
