





The appearance of the prisoner certainly did not correspond with the legitimate possession of such costly ornaments, but he asserted his innocence of the charge and declared that he had.... found the watch and chain on the pavement. The judge looked at the ... man in the dock and then at the men in the box. "Gentlemen of the jury," he said, 'I have walked over" the pavement of London during the last forty years, and I've never found a gold watch and chain there yet. Consider your virdict!"
