U.S. Flyers in Round the World Flight to Seek no Time Record

NEW YORK, March 14 (A.P.) - When the squadron of the United States Army Air Service starts upon its round-the-world flight from Santa Monica, Cal., March 17 no attempt will be made for a time record unless conditions obtain that will not interfere with the success of the undertaking. Preparations have been made on the basis of completing the flight without consideration of a time record, and with the idea of learning as much as possible of the practical benefit of the effort to commercial aviation.

The only element of time considered in working out a theoretical schedule is that the flight must be completed by the latter part of August. This is due to the fact that that part of the flight to be made after leaving Denmark must be conducted when the northern waters around the southern end of Greenland are comparatively free from ice. After August it is expected those waters will become too thickly congested with ice to permit landings.

In preparation for the flight the officers selected to make it have gone through a course of training at Langley Field, Va., the course including navigation, meteorology and actual flying in the type of plane to be used in the round-the-world flight. These world cruisers are designed as both land and water type, being steadily converted by the interchangeable feature of wheels and pontoons.

The pontoons will be attached to the planes first at Seattle, Wash., and will remain until the flyers reach Japan. Then it is planned to substitute the landing gears, which will be used across Asia Minor and Europe as far as Hull, England. At the latter place the pontoons will again be attached to the planes and used until the flight reached Montreal and possibly Keyport, N.J.

A feature of the preparations for the flight was the path-finding expeditions of two officers who went over what are regarded the most diffcult portions of the route. Lieutenant Clarence E. Crumrine covered the span between Hull, England, and Montreal, paying particular attention to Greenland, where two landings must be made under the most difficult conditions. Lieutenant Clifford C. Nutt went to the Philippine Islands and thence to the Asiatic mainland to make preliminary arrangements through courtesies extended by the governments of Japan, China, Great Britain and France. The Aeronautical Chamher of Commerce of America gave valuable assistance to the air service in all preparations for the flight. The proposed airway around the

earth has been sub-divided into six divisions as follows: First, beginning at Washington, D.C., and ending at Attu Island in the Aleutian group; second, ending at Nagasaki, Japan: third ending at Constantinople; fifth, ending at London; sixth, ending at Washington. Each division will have a main depot with one or more subdepots for major items of supply, Gasoline, oil and smaller articles of supply have been placed at virtually all stops. Scattered at various points along the proposed route have been placed the equivalent, in parts, of 15 Liberty engines, with which the planes are equipped, and about 200 per cent. replacements in the airplanes themselves. Extra pontoons have been stored along the route where the flying will be entirely over water.

The longest leg of the flight, according to the present plans, will be from Attu Island to Paramishiru Island, in the northern part of the Kurile Islands group, a possession of Japan. Other long flights will be necessary over the Atlantic Ocean between the Farce Islands and Iceland; between Greenland and northern Canada. The longest of these is about 700 miles.

Immigrants Practice Almost Forgetten Handicrafts

Margaret M. Speechly, writing in

the Grain Growers' Guide, says numerous newcomers from Iceland, the Scandinavian countries and even from the British Isles, have brought spinning wheels and other utensils for ancient handicraft with them to their new homes in Manitoba. Many of the older women spin their own yarn, and knit socks, mittens, etc. Near Arborg, Man., home-made mittens have become quite an important article of commerce—the output beingsold through a local co-operative store to wholesale houses and individual merchants. One old lady has even made her own blankets on a hand loom. At Victoria, B.C., Mrs. Dennis Harris, who is herself able to spin and weave, has sought out others with like skill, but devotes her own efforts mainly to spinning yarn and dyeing sweaters as part of sporting outfits. Quilting bees are also being held in the West.
