The Vice-Chancellor Dismisses Clothes London.—It is reported from Oxford that the Oxford trousers are rapidly passing and that Plus Fours are to return in their stead.

According to a leading tailor in Oxford Plus Fours will be in brown shades of Scotch and Shetland tweeds, with shirts, collars and stockings and pullover jumpers to harmonize with them. "The day of the vividly colored jumper is over," he continued. "There will be bold colorings and designs, but there will be nothing effeminate about them."

The vice-chancellor of the university, Dr. Joseph W. The number of motors was continually increasing, and the proctors had ordained that undergraduates on their first year should not bring motors to Oxford. That policy Cambridge had subsequently followed in order to lessen the peril to people using the streets.

Among the arrivals for the new term were a number of young Hungarians, who were attending the university by arrangement with the Hungarian government. When they have taken their degrees they will return as masters of a special school the Hungarian government is setting up. It will be run on English lines, and an English graduate is shortly to be appointed headmaster.

Toronto Presbytery Will Raise \$100,000

INDIAN MISSIONARY DESCRIBES GANDHI AS A FRAUD.

The Presbyterian presbytery of Toronto to-day accepted an allocation of \$100,000 to be raised toward the budget of the continuing Presbyterian church, and appointed a committee to advise as to the reallocation of this sum among the churches in the district, and as to ways and means of raising it. On the basis of the anti-union vote in Toronto the presbytery has a total congregational membership of 19,000. Rev. MacNamara estimated that this requires a per capita contribution of slightly more than \$1.00 in order to attain its objective.

The committee in charge of reallocation is composed of Rev. W. F. McConnell and Rev. J. M. MacGillivray, joint convenors. Rev. J. G. Inister, Rev. J. Paulin, Rev. Stuart Parker, Rev. Jas. Wilson, Rev. C. K. Nichols and Rev. J. M. Dunn, and Messrs. James Logie, F. S. Sheppard, Wm. Mackenzie and John Wylie.

Gandhi Pious Fraud

Rev. Dr. Wilkie of the Gwalior, India, Presbyterian mission, briefly outlined the work there, to which he is returning this month after a furlough in Canada. He commented on the fact that the Gwalior mission property was subject to the award of the church property commission.

"If they take away our property, though I can't conceive of such a piece of stealing, for that is what it would be," he declared. "But we have other spiritual belongings there, of which they cannot deprive us. We hold in our hands, in the gospel of Christ, the only real solution of the Oriental problem."

He described Gandhi as "the biggest, most frank of the age, a man who is using his Christian training to deceive you and to destroy the British government and the Christian church."

The presbytery approved the uniting of the Agincourt and St. Andrew's-Scarboro churches. Calls extended by St. David's congregation to Rev. G. E. Bamford of Williams-town, Pa., and by Aurora to Rev. A. L. Rich of St. Andrew's-Scarboro were withdrawn. The question of

Diabetes Treatment

Arousing Interest

Palliative Absorbed Through Mouth Would be Forward Step, Says Prof. Macleod.

(Toronto Daily Star.)

"A really effective palliative for diabetes, which could be absorbed through the mouth, would be a definite advance in research," said Dr. J. J. R. Macleod, head of the Commonwealth laboratories at the University of Toronto, in referring to the recent discovery made by Dr. J. M. Rabinowitch of the Montreal General Hospital. It is claimed in recent despatches from Montreal that the new discovery which can be taken through the mouth will displace insulin in all but most severe cases, due to the fact that it overcomes necessity of daily injection by hypodermic syringe.

Dr. Macleod stated that as yet he was entirely unfamiliar with the new discovery, his first intimation of it having been through information contained in the daily press. He however remarked that he was personally acquainted with Dr. Rabinowitch, who is known to him as a thoroughly reliable man and one whose statements carry no small weight.

"We have often endeavored to produce insulin which would be effective when absorbed through the mouth," Dr. Macleod went on, "but so far we have never succeeded. Such a remedy would overcome the continual pain of constant hypodermic injections. But as to the effectiveness of this particular discovery, I am not in a position to express an opinion."

Dr. F. G. Banting, the discoverer of insulin, was unhesitating in his affirmation that it would be a very great advantage if insulin could be administered through the mouth. "So far, insulin has been destroyed by the digestive juices, so that taking it through the mouth has rendered it ineffective," he said. "We have tried at various times to administer insulin in different forms through the mouth but have always been unsuccessful. I shall be very glad if the new discovery in all that is claimed for it, but as yet I am not familiar with its actual details."

The new substance which has been produced by Dr. Rabinowitch is a sweet syrup somewhat analogous to sugar, obtained from glycerine on which a certain bacterium has been allowed to act, whereas insulin is obtained from the pancreas of animals. The new substance which is known as dioxycetone has already been administered with some success to certain patients in the Montreal General Hospital, it is claimed.
