In deed, it is one of life's great lessons that all must learn.

Don't talk about your children in front of them. It is very ad for Willie to hear when he is near this remark: Willie's such a bad boy. I can't take my eyes off him. He won't mind me and I can't do anything with him." This makes Willie think that it's no use for him to try to be good, he can't don it,-or that there's rather a distinction about naughtiness because his mother tells it. "He's that high-spirited, you know," he often hears her say and he feels that if she likes to tell the neighbors about him, he is rather a wonderful little person after all.

Don't nag at a child. Always say "do" and seldom say "don't If the child's act is bad punish him for it. Whenever you can, say "Please do this, it helps mother." Thi sis the suggestion of helping someone and it is so much better than: "Don't do this." Why, the very "don't" creates in the child the desire to do it.

Let children have plenty of wholesome pleasure but see that they give pleasure and help to others in their turn. We hear a great deal about giving children a good time and about the value of happy childhood. This is true but it will only lead to unhappy selfishness if we heap pleasures and gifts upon them and do not teach them to help others in their turn.

No teacher or school in the world can do for children what parents can, and no teacher or school can undo the harm
