DOMINION NEWS IN BRIEF.

General Booth is in Winnipeg. Ridgeway has a debt of \$85,000. Ottawa taxes are in arrears \$387,000. Montreal has a prosperous chess club. Ottawa's ice palace is about finished. The flood in the Forest Valley is abating. The dog poisoner is abroad at Wyoming. Enniskillen farmers want a cow by law. Chancellor Boyd opened the Assizes Friday. Preston will soon be lighted by electricity. Belleville badly defeated a free library. Mason's store, Wingham, has been robbed. The Toronto University Club met at Ottawa. The repairs on the Rideau Canal are complete. Belleville thinks of having a summer carnival. The knitting mills at Port Dover work overtime. A 450 foot dock is to be built at Amherstburg. The Nixon Works, Ingersoll, have been reopened. C.P.R. shops at Perth are running on overtime. Beamsville is having its new water pipes laid. Enniskillen is now entirely free of diphtheria. Mayor Carruthers, North Bay, is an old Harris boy. Lieut. Col. Skinner left an estate valued at \$45,000. Bond Head has a new add a good weekly paper. The Palmiston woolen mill is again in operation. A Patron convention was held at Smithville Saturday. There are now 11 vacancies in the Dominion Senate. The Ontario Government will improve Road East Park. The Homing Pigeon Club, London, is to be re-organized. Aylmer has 129 widows and spinners entitled to vote. Madoc Presbyterian Church has been destroyed by fire. Reports of a gold discovery near Chatham have revived. Kingston capitalists may build an elevator at Montreal. The diphtheria epidemic in Chatham continues unabated. Frank Flynn, Hamilton, aged 14, is missing from his home. Victoria, B.C., wants its fire department service improved. Aylmer is connected with Paris green at Bolton Saturday. Masked burglars are operating in the outskirts of Hamilton. J. H. Clava, drygoods merchant of Bradford, has resigned. W. A. Marsh has been elected president of the Quebec Y.M.C.A. The Congregation Church at Sarnia was damaged by fire Saturday. The Western Dairyman Association is in annual convention at Stratford. T. S. Wade has been elected president of the Bradford Horticultural Society. General Booth closed his meetings in Winnipeg Friday night and started east. Mrs. Moore of Windsor, Que., drowned herself and her baby at that place Saturday. Arthur L. Campbell, son of a railroad official at Moncton, N.B., suicided Saturday. The Cabinet held a morning meeting on Saturday at which Premier Bowell presided. Mr. J. A. Cantlee has been re-elected president of the Montreal Board of Trade. The Police Commissioners of Hamilton have asked for the resignation of Chief McKinnon. Liberals of Lisgar, Man., will select their candidate for the Gannout at Moncton, Feb. 5. The body of Senator Tasse was Saturday taken from Montreal to Ottawa for interment. Dismissed C.P.R. employees at Winnipeg talk of establishing a colony and taking to the mountains. St. David's Lodge A.F. & A.M., at St. Thomas had its new lodge room dedicated Friday night. The total amount received by the Minister of Finance for the Lady Thompson fund is \$15,000. Mr. Strachan of the Winnipeg Exhibition Association is suing The Tribune for \$100,000 for libel. A new election will have to be held for the third aldermanic seat in Ottawa as a result of a recount. The first weekly sitting of the High Court in the west was held at London by Mr. Justice Meredith. North Victoria Liberals will meet in convention on Feb. 22 to select a candidate for the Legislature. Naval authorities at Halifax have received word that H.M.S. Crescent would succeed the Banks as flagship at that station. The Kingston P.P.A. has decided to take no part in the election contest between Hon. Mr. Hart and Dr. Smythe as an organization. Hamilton's City Engineer Hoekins says the city during the past year has spent \$90,000, and that he "cannot see where the money has been expended. The Rev. Lyman Abbott of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, N.Y., and Mrs. Abbott, will arrive in Montreal on Feb. 5, and will be the guests of the Governor-General. It is reported at St. John's that the Government is in correspondence with the Dominion Government regarding terms for Newfoundland's admission into the Dominion. It is reported in Ottawa that the Governor-General has offered to defray the expenses of educating the two sons of Sir John Thompson, who are studying law in Toronto. A Gossip from Rochester says that Louise Monroe, aged 19, who ran away from her home in St. Catharines, Ont., was arrested Friday night at Rochester station on a train. Subscribers to the Thompson Memorial Fund are desired to forward the funds to the Minister of Finance before the end of this month, as the list will be closed on the 31st and trustees selected to manage the fund. The statement of the Commercial Bank of Newfoundland shows liabilities of \$2,011,000 and assets of \$1,463,000, less preferences of \$416,000 to the Savings Bank. It is thought the assets will pay 48 or 50 cents on the dollar. The unemployed of Montreal to the number of 3000 gathered about the City Hall, and the services of the police were required to disperse the crowd, which grew disorderly. Several people were hurt when the police charged the crowd, using their batons freely. A meeting of the Reformers of South Huron, as constituted for Dominion purposes, will be held at Brucefield on Friday, Jan. 25, at 1 o'clock p.m. The object of the meeting is the election of officers for the current year, organization for the approaching election and the transaction of other important business. The French treaty was considered by the Cabinet at Ottawa Friday.
