THE SEIZURE OF MANCHURIA

Russia's Coup Arouses Some Jingo Talk in London.

Her Majesty's Government Sends the Armed Cruiser Blenheim to the Orient—British Minister, Sir Ernest Sartow, Proposes a Commercial Treaty With China—Draft Not Yet Accepted by the Powers, But Discussion Is Proposed.

London, Jan. 8.—Russia's quiet appropriation of Manchuria provokes a good deal of wild war talk in London. Those who advocate Anglo-German resistance to the Czar's "grab" derived some satisfaction from last night's Admiralty bulletin ordering Her Majesty's cruiser Blenheim to leave for the China station this week.

Were Not to Sign. Peking, Jan. 7.—The report that the Chinese court had instructed the Chinese peace envoys to refuse to sign the joint note of the powers to China is confirmed. The court referred to the objections of the Southern Viceroy, which are the same as the court have. Prince Ching, however, informed the court that it was too late, and a reply from the court is expected shortly.

The Treaties Presented. Peking, Jan. 7.—This afternoon agreements, identical for each nation, were presented to Prince Ching. These close to Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang say they have decided to sign, even if they lose their heads, without regard to the latest orders from the court. Others who are apparently equally close say they will not sign immediately, asserting also that there are two factions surrounding the court, equally strong, and that it will be impolitic for the Chinese plenipotentiaries at present to act for themselves.

Treaty With China. Shanghai, Jan. 7.—Sir Ernest Sartow, British Minister to China, has proposed to the other foreign envoys the draft of a commercial treaty with China based upon the following conditions: 1. Freedom for all coasting vessels. 2. Freedom for all vessels on inland waters, especially the Yangtze Kiang. 3. Permission to import foreign salt. 4. Adoption of regulations encouraging Chinese investments in foreign concerns. 5. Steps extending China's exports and imports. 6. Protection for trade marks. 7. Protection of treaty ports.

The Russia-China Deal. London, Jan. 8.—The British Foreign Office considers the reported agreement between Russia and China regarding the Manchurian Province of Feng Tien as probably referring to military measures of a temporary character. There is nothing in the possession of the Foreign Office to show that any such agreement has the sanction of Russia and China. In the opinion of the Foreign Office there is likely to be a great deal more discussion before the Chinese plenipotentiaries finally agree to the penalties insisted upon by the powers.

REV. M. SHAYER HORSEWHIPPED. Husband of Cobourg Lady Flogs Him on the Street. Cobourg, Jan. 8.—Rev. Melville Shayer preached to a crowded church Sunday night on "Wrongs in Cobourg Which Must Be Made Right." During the course of his remarks he referred to some of Cobourg's leading lady citizens as going to the local shooting gallery. The remarks were such as to cause considerable indignation among the parties referred to. Last evening about 5.20 he was met on the front street by one of the ladies, accompanied by her husband, who publicly horsewhipped Mr. Shayer. The affair has caused intense excitement in the town.

After the Brithers. Winnipeg, Jan. 8.—Informations were laid against Frank J. Messner of Holmfeld and Hugh A. McKinnon of Cartwright, Man., charging them with bribery in the late election in Lisgar, on behalf of Winkler, the Liberal candidate. After all the evidence was in and Messner and McKinnon committed for trial, Mr. Elliott, in open court, made an offer on behalf of the Crown that if any person in Lisgar would lay information before him of any bribery perpetrated by Richardson, or on his behalf, he would undertake on behalf of the Crown, to institute proceedings at once. The announcement was greeted with cheers. The actual bills paid by Messner for bribery purposes are in possession of the Crown.

Fire Among Toys. London, Ont., Jan. 8.—While employees in the big departmental store on Dundas street known as Wood's Fair were putting goods on shelves in the upper story of the building a lamp which they were using suddenly exploded, and before the fire was gotten under control a loss of between \$3,000 and \$4,000 to the goods and building was sustained. The flames gained a foothold in the big wholesale toy department, and completely wiped out this stock.

Date of North Bruce Protest. Toronto, Jan. 8.—Chancellor Boyd has fixed upon Friday, Jan. 25, as the date upon which the North Bruce contested election trial will be held at Owen Sound. The protest is against the recent return of Alexander McNeil as member of the Federal House.

COLONISTS HAVE A GOLD FIT

Cape Town Calls Loudly For Strong Reinforcements.

The News From South Africa Again Unsatisfactory—Call to Arms of the Loyalists Likely to Be Taken as a Challenge—Dr. Leyds Recruiting in Europe—Dewet Has Disappeared—Boers Are Rampant.

London, Jan. 7.—This morning's news from Cape Town is again unsatisfactory. Martial law has been proclaimed at Malmesbury, and would have been proclaimed in other districts, but that the Cabinet meeting, Saturday, was unable to agree as to its advisability.

The vagueness of the information concerning the movements and position of the invaders has sent a fresh cold fit over the colonists, and Cape Town calls loudly for strong reinforcements from England. On the ground that the greater part of Lord Kitchener's available force is employed in protecting the lines of communication and the Rand Mines, the latter extending for a distance of 50 miles.

It is asserted by one Cape Town correspondent that unless the forces in Cape Colony are increased, a most undesirable state of affairs will result, as the success in arms of the invaders, however slight, might be the signal for a Dutch rising. As it is, many British residents have had to leave the Dutch villages near Cape Town, their lives being unbearable.

According to a native report, 100 men, either Boers or local farmers, have just passed through Clan Kilmuir district, in the direction of Malmesbury. Calls For 40,000 Fresh Troops. The Cape Town correspondent of The Daily Mail, who calls for 40,000 fresh troops, says: "Prominent Afrikaner Loyalists declare that the rebellious colonists will construe the colonial call to arms as a challenge, and that the ominous silence of the pro-rebels, combined with the fact that the members of the pro-Boer Junta in Cape Town have been touring in the disaffected districts, emphasizes the necessity for martial law. The necessity was never more acute for dispatching reinforcements. Already there is proof that colonials are leading one commando."

The military movements reported are quite unimportant, though Portugal is sending reinforcements to Lorenzo Marquez. Dr. Leyds, according to The Hague correspondent of The Daily Mail, is recruiting in Holland, Belgium, France and Germany, and his recruits will be sent out to Namaqualand, ostensibly as emigrants, each man receiving £50 down.

Dewet Has Disappeared. London, Jan. 7.—Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office under date of Pretoria, Jan. 4, as follows: "The Boers have reappeared along the railway in the neighborhood of Rhenoster, but it doubtful that Dewet is with them."

"With regard to the situation in Cape Colony, the Western commando is making towards Calvin and the eastern party appears to have broken up into small parties. "Another small body crossed the Orange River west of Alival North yesterday."

An Urgency Meeting. Cape Town, Jan. 5.—An urgency meeting of the Cabinet was convened at noon to-day after a long consultation between the British High Commissioner Sir Alfred Milner, and the Premier, Sir J. Gordon Sprigg. An important pronouncement is expected.

Liverpool Men Released. London, Jan. 7.—The Boers have released the members of the Liverpool Regiment captured at Helvetia, Dec. 29.

3,000 More Men. Melbourne, Jan. 7.—In response to the suggestion from Colonial Secretary Chamberlain that more troops from the colonies would be acceptable for service in South Africa, 1,000 men have volunteered at Victoria, 600 in South Australia, and 1,000 in New Zealand. These men have signified their desire to serve against the Boers.

Britain's Losses. London, Jan. 7.—The War Office yesterday issued a list of casualties during the war in South Africa, which shows that the total deaths were 604 officers and 11,554 men. In addition to this four officers and 243 men died of wounds or disease after returning home.

Coming Home on the Tunisian. Ottawa, Jan. 7.—The following members of the Canadian contingent sailed on the Tunisian on Thursday: Sergt. Stayer, 41, Brown; 252, Tunstead; 7,380, Robson; 47, Brown; 8,141, Purcell; 7,711, Wilkins.

New Commandant of R.M.C. London, Jan. 7.—Major Reade of the Shropshire Light Infantry has been selected to succeed Col. Kitson, C. M. G., as commandant of the Royal Military College at Kingston, Canada. He is a well-known corps. Col. Kitson goes to Washington, U. S., as a member of the Diplomatic Corps.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—Col. Otter was in the city on Saturday and spent the morning in conference with the officials at the Militia Department. It was stated officially that his visit had no special significance, but his appointment to the Kingston Military College is said to be as good as made.

Kingston, Jan. 8.—Letters received from Panama say the relations between Colombia and Venezuela are much strained in consequence of the latter's connivance with and the assistance being given to the revolutionists in the former country. The activity of the rebels, it is added, only restrains Colombia from taking warlike measures against Venezuela, and even now Colombian troops are being moved to the border. The rebels are still receiving large supplies of arms and ammunition through Venezuela.


The strike is on again. Pictou, N. S., Jan. 8.—The strike at Acadia mines is on again. It seems that one of the strikers in the first strike refused to assist the manager to keep the mine from any danger happening through overflow of water. On this account the manager refused to do any work, and was told yesterday morning that his services were not required. Immediately it became known the miners at Acadia struck again. No agreement, has been arrived at between the miners and management.

Three Warships Menace La Guayra. Willemstad, Curacao, Jan. 8.—The United States Minister at Caracas, Venezuela, Mr. F. B. Loomis, according to the latest advice received here, has not yet succeeded in obtaining justice for the New York and Martinez Asphalt Company, in its dispute with the local authorities, and the situation is regarded as critical. Three American warships are either at La Guayra or on their way there (the Buffalo, the Hartford and the Scorpion).
