Residents of St. Thomas are agitating for a "Made-in-St. Thomas" exhibition.
Edward R. Moylan, formerly M. C. R. conductor, has been appointed on the St. Thomas police force.
Oliver Jay, an old resident of Sparta, died on Sunday, aged 76 years. He is survived by his wife, one daughter and two sons.
Chas. Laing, for shooting through the window of the M.C.R. station at Hawtrey, was sentenced by Police Magistrate Hunt to three years in jail.
Tom Montague, of Galt, a former West Lorne boy, has been successful in his examination at McGill University, Montreal. Out of a class of 100, thirty were successful, Tom standing fifth.
There are evidences of oil and gas in the vicinity of Frome and a number of farmers have incorporated a company to be called "The North Elgin Oil and Gas Co.", to exploit the oil and gas.

SOUTHWOLD COUNCIL.
The council elected for the township of Southwold for 1906 met at the township hall, Fingal, on Monday. All the members present and subscribed to their respective declarations of office and property qualifications.
Jelly-Turner—That K. W. McKay be appointed auditor of the books and accounts of the township of Southwold for 1906 at a salary of \$50.
Jelly-Gilbert—That Leonard Else be appointed assessor for the township of Southwold for 1906 at a salary of \$125.—Carried.
Jelly-Gilbert—That E. P. Boughner be appointed collector for the year 1906 of taxes at a salary of \$125.—Carried.
Jelly-Turner—That John Steele be appointed a member of the local board of health for three years from the above date.—Carried.
Jelly-Turner—That the following members of the council take charge of the respective wards of the township in 1906 as follows:
Ward No. 4—H. J. Henderson, reeve.
Ward No. 1—W. H. Turner, councillor.
Ward No. 3—A. Gilbert, councillor.
Ward No. 2—M. B. Stafford, councillor.
Ward No. 5—R. T. Jelly, councillor.—Carried.
Stafford-Gilbert—That the court of revision on the assessment roll of the township of Southwold for 1906 be held on Monday, the 28th day of May, 1906, at 10 o'clock a.m., at the township hall.—Carried.
Stafford-Gilbert—That Robert T. Jelly be appointed to look after the interests of the township as to the crossings of the Southwestern Traction Co. on the township roads, with power to act.—Carried.

ALDBOROUGH COUNCIL.
Minutes of the council of Aldborough, held at Rodney on Jan. 8, all the members being present and subscribed to the necessary declarations of office.
Currie-Howse—That the clerk be paid a salary of \$475 per year, he to assume all the work of the township and all the fees to go into the general funds of the township.—Carried.
McLean-Howse—That the assessor be paid \$195 for assessing the township, and that the collector be paid \$100 for collecting said taxes for the year 1906.—Carried.
Mr. Huggill declining the office as clerk at \$475 per year, the following motion was put and carried and Mr. Huggill accepted the clerkship.
Stinson-Howse—That E. A. Huggill be appointed clerk at a salary of \$500 per year.
Currie-McLean—That D. L. McMillan be appointed collector for 1906 at a salary of \$100.—Lost.
Stinson-Howse—That D. A. McKillop be appointed collector for 1906 at the same salary as last year.—Carried.
The collector was instructed to accept \$117 in full for taxes from D. A. Campbell for 1905.
Currie-Howse—That D. McPherson be appointed treasurer for 1906 at a salary of \$150.—Carried.
D. Carmichael was re-appointed member of the Board of Health, Dr. Donald, medical health officer; J. C. Chasley, sanitary inspector.
Currie-Howse—That the salaries of the township auditors for auditing the accounts of 1905 be \$25 each.—Carried.
A. Carmichael and T. C. Campbell were appointed auditors.
McLean-Stinson—That this council are opposed to the Good Roads scheme being adopted by the council until it has been submitted to the ratepayers of the different municipalities, and in case a by-law should be so submitted that the council designate the Graham road and Furnival road as the roads to be brought under the Act.—Carried.
McLean-Stinson—That the collector be instructed to accept the sum of \$83.76 from Sarah Heatherington in full of taxes for 1905, balance of \$28.16 being the amount of exemption on grist mill.—Carried.
J. A. McLean was appointed commissioner for ward 1, N. Currie for ward 2, B. House for ward 3, and O. R. G. Stinsonson for ward 4.
After passing a number of orders on the treasurer the council adjourned to meet in West Lorne on Feb. 6.

Interesting Items of Happenings in the Western Peninsula.
Chatham has a mild case of smallpox.
The Molsons Bank will open a branch at Merlin.
The Ridgeway Plaindealer says maple trees in that town are budding.
Ridgeway Public Library had receipts of \$329.47 and disbursed \$529.92.
Dugald Baldwin, late of the Eagle fishery, has purchased a fishery in Michigan.
Howard Agricultural Society had a balance to their credit of \$170.98. There are 139 members.
Rev. J. A. McGillivray, who is leaving London for Vancouver, was presented with a gold watch.
The barns and contents belonging to James Seale, Biddulph, were destroyed by fire on Sunday night.
St. Paul's Episcopal church, costing \$10,000, was opened at Stratford on Sunday by Bishop Williams.
Two townships, Tilbury North and Bradford, have decided to return to the old system of statute labor.
John Smith, W. M. Baker and James Peters have been appointed license commissioners for West Middlesex.
Rev. Mr. Dickie, of Toronto, has accepted the call to Chalmers Church, Woodstock, to succeed the late Dr. McKay.
Dresden ratepayers defeated a by-law to raise \$18,000 for a new schoolhouse. The amount asked was considered too much.
Granny McKay, of Guilda, and Collins Handy, sr., of Morpeth, each 94 years of age, voted at the recent municipal election.
Miss Alice Mansco, of London, fell down stairs and injured her spine so severely that it is doubtful if she can recover.
Hamilton citizens will send to the great Olympic games in Greece William Sherring, the long distance runner, and Robert Kerr, the Canadian sprinter.
Dr. Dugald Galbraith, a well known Ekfrid boy, now a physician of Lansing, Mich., was married recently to Miss Carmichael, of Barrie, a nurse in one of the city hospitals.
Charles Gow, who was convicted of the manslaughter of little Tommy Hill, in Dumfries township, in August last, has served a three months' term in the county jail, and was released yesterday.
In the assize court at London the jury granted Mrs. Clarke, an elderly lady, \$1,000 and \$1,200 to her husband against the street railway. She had an arm fractured by the car starting too soon.
As the result of his children playing with matches the barn of Robert Gibbs, Moore, was destroyed by fire. The contents included five head of cattle and valuable farm machinery, all being totally destroyed.
The Government subsidized the railways of Canada to the amount of \$54,979,655.40 last year. Of this amount the little jerk-water line with the high-sounding name of Tillsonburg, Lake Erie & Pacific, received \$117,431.48.

PLUMBERS FINED \$10,000.
Toronto, Jan. 15.—Fines, aggregating \$10,000, were imposed upon thirty-nine plumbers in the assize court by Chancellor Boyd. In all 97 were convicted, and sentence was suspended upon those not fined. All of those arraigned pleaded guilty.
"From the material laid before me it has been evident that the larger firms and the leading master plumbers have controlled the men in smaller businesses," said Chancellor Boyd, "so that they have been forced into the combination to endeavor to make a living, and in some way strive to better their conditions."
"Many of the latter are hardly able to make headway, having large families and little work. Many have actually been losers by being driven into the combination. These classes have been as leniently dealt with as possible. As to those better off and in a larger way of business, I have scaled or graded so as to impose some fine on those who have received dividends from the illegal prices, but heavier fines are imposed, though far from the maximum of the statute, on those who have made the largest gains from the combination. It seems to me better not to go beyond the highest figure of Justice Clute's judgment, though I think he erred on the side of leniency."
