## Gone to His Rest

Death of the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie

After an Illness That Lasted Many Weeks.

Closing Hours of the Honored and Venerable Ex-Premier of the Deminion-Recollections of His Busy and Useful

TORONTO, April 17 .- After a protracted illness of many weeks Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, M. P. for East York, and ex-Premier of the Dominion of Canada, died at his residence, St. Alban's, between 12 and I o'clock this morning. The venerable statesman had been in very feeble health nearly all through winter as the result of a fall which he sustained early in February, though it was not till about six weeks ago that his condition became serious. During those six weeks a desperate contest be those six weeks a desperate contest between life and death was sustained with
wonderful vitality, and it was marvelous
that the end was deferred so long.
Only a constitution of iron preserved by a
life of regularity could have given to any man
such tenacity of life. From the beginning
of his long illness the condition of the illustrious patient was practically hopeless, for
while at times there was a slight rally the
improvement was never at any time sufficient to warrant hope of permanent recovery.

A HOPELESS STRUGGLE.

A HOPELESS STRUGGLE.

Dr. Thorburn, for many years the friend and medical attendant of the late Premier, with unremitting fattention, used every device known to science to ward off the impending blow; but a few days ago he was compelled to announce that the end was fast approaching, and the family were fully prepared when death at length came.

Mr. Mackenzie's devoted wife, and Chas. Mackenzie's devoted wife, and Chas. Mackenzie deader's brother, were constantly at his bedside, and with him at the moment of dissolution, as were also Rev. Dr. Thompson and wife (of Sarnia), son-inlaw and daughter of deceased.

Mr. Mackenzie practically took no nourishment for some days past, and was only at times partly conscious, being however, comparatively free from pain.

A VACANT SEAT IN PARLIAMENT.

By the death of Hon, Alex, Mackenzie a vacancy is created in the representation of East York in the Dominion Commons. His sickness prevented his attendance at all this session, and even last session the feeleleness which was gradually overtaking him prevented regular attention to his Parliamentary duties, which up to that time had been a strking characteristic of his political career.

#### WOMAN SUFFRACE

Indorsed by the New York Legislature,

But May Be Voted Down in the Senate or Vetoed by the Governor-Susan B. Anthony on the Subject.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 17 .- The Assembly on Friday passed, by a vote of 70 to 34, a bill giving women the right of suffrage in all State elections.

SUSAN B. ANTHONY ON THE SUBJECT.

ROCHESTER, N.Y., April 17.—A reporter called on Miss Susan B. Anthony at her home and asked her what she thought of the Woman Suffrage Bill, just passed in the Assembly. She said:

"Why, of course, I am highly pleased, and I hope it will fare as well in the Senate and with the Governor, but I am not very enthusiastic. CHICAGO, Ill., April 17.—The new Illinois law allowing women to vote at school elections causes some exciting times in the rural districts. Yesterday at Cisco, in Platt county, the issue was on the question of a graded high school. The district lies partly in Platt and Macon counties. Edward Reeser was brought out by the Macon voters, andhe received some support in Platt. The Tatt voters had for a candidate A. E. Parr, who championed the cause of the graded school. It was conceded late in the day that Parr and the proposition to have a graded high school were defeated. The Platt voters, learning this, sent word to the women at Cisco, who marched to the polls, voted solidly for Parr and elected him by a good majority.
