The Paris Carpet Factory to Go to St. Catharines.

The Missing B. M. E. Minister of Windsor Heard From.

He Will Return Oct. 20 and Then See "Who's Who" Burglary at Chatham—Milk Licenses for Woodstock.

BRANT.

Negotiations are in progress for the removal of the Paris carpet factory to St. Catharines.

Stephen Smith, Brantford, has been awarded the contract for supplying polishing and brass brushes to the Militia Department at Ottawa.

Mrs. Thea. Grantham, a well-known resident of Brantford, has passed away at the age of 88 years.

At Brantford's last city council meeting the bylaw to give the new farmers' binder two company exemptions of taxation for ten years was given its third reading and passed. A contract was closed for one year only with the Brantford Electric Light Company to do the public lighting of the streets.

ELGIN.

Water J. Arnold, residing in Detroit, and for the past ten or twelve years a salesman in C. J. Whitney's music store, has been arrested on the charge of forgery.

An examination of the warrant on which Mr. Arnold was taken shows that it was issued by Magistrate Bartlett, of Windsor, on the complaint of Charles Sutton, who swears that on Jan. 13, 1876, at Harwich, Ont., the accused forged his (Sutton's) name to a promissory note for \$150.

The officer making the arrest Mr. Sutton said that during the last sixteen years nothing had been seen or heard of Arnold.

Whether day, however, while passing Arnold's music store he saw and recognized Arnold, and at once proceeded to arrest him.

Arnold, who is now an excellent musician, when arrested he was just passing a sale for a piano to a customer, and he officers kindly declined service until he had cleared the transaction and bowed the customer out.

Rev. W. T. Minter, the missing pastor of the B. M. E. Church, Windsor, has been heard from. His actions were as to the church funds. Mr. Minter says that he was robbed of the church fund, and the pastor of the said church and also from the conference. Mr. Minter went to England for a job, and the conference people claim that he carried away \$100 of the church funds.

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NORTH AND WEST OXFORD.

INGERSOLL, Oct. 5.—The Ingersoll, North and West Oxford agricultural fall show opened under very favorable auspices. The exhibits in horses, grain, roots, etc., were brought upon the grounds in very large numbers and excellent quality. The entries are larger in most of the classes, especially in horses, than they have been in years past.

SEAFOORTH, Oct. 5.—The South Huron fall show opened here yesterday. The first day was mainly devoted to the placing of the indoor exhibits, of which there is the largest and best display ever made here, roots, fruits and dairy products being particularly good.
