Thomson Thought To Have Died of Poison and Not by Drowning.

The Dead Lovers Will Be Buried Together.

Romeo and Juliet Enacted in Real

Life. Thomson's Lawyer to be Present To-Day -Rumors Regarding the Reason for

the Deeds-Why Were the Purse Strings Tightened?

If Shakespeare were alive to-day, he could almost find material enough for another "Romeo and Juliet" in the terrible tragedy that was enacted in this city on Sunday. There is the strongest ground for the belief that the young man Thomson was not drowned, but committed suicide, And that with the same death-dealing drug that he had purchased and given to his sweetheart, who finished her life by that identical agency when she heard of his death. There was, perhaps, some secret

compact between the two, probably a hysterical promise that they should live for king among men in body, mind and heart. one another and die together. It has been established that Thomson was all he when failing or lost, are restored by this claimed to be. He was one of a wealthy treatment. Victims of abuses and excesses, firm, was a young and talented gentleman, was a registered chemist and a lawyer, and last but by no means least, a shorthand writer. gain your vigor! SYMPATHY FOR THE M'RECHNIES. Nothing but words of sorrow are heard on all sides for the bereaved McKechnie family. Bella was a general favorite, a bright, winsome girl, and of a very warm and impulsive nature. When she heard of her lover's death, and after her first terrible screams, she grew strangely calm, and coolly gave the young man the addresses of Mr. Thomson's people in Scotland. Then she went into hysterics again, and when she recovered and became quiet she said she would go to her room and lie down for a little while, and wished to be left alone. Then she re membered her promise to her dead lover and coolly drank that most deadly of all poisons-prussic acid. In a little while Mr. W. J. Lindsay called. He had heard that Bella was drowned with Mr. Thomson, and had come up to verify the news. He lists have been invited to hold services in was an old friend of Miss McKechnie, and the People's Church, Boston, the largest Methodith Church in Massachusetts. They together with Mrs. Lennie went upstairs to see how she was getting on. When they got there her spirit had joined that of her

lover, and two young lives had been blotted ont for love. THOMSON PROBABLY POISONED. A post mortem examination on the remains of Thomson was made by Dr. Weld and the result will be disclosed at the inquest. There is every reason, however, for the belief that Thomson died from prussic acid poisoning. The symptoms were not those of a drowned man, but of a poisoned one. No doubt the death struggle began before his body touched the water. The brain was said by medical men to be one of the best developed that they had ever seen. He had been a man of extra-

ordinary intellect. A gold plate and several alse teeth were in the roof of the mouth. THE PROBABLE REASON. As usual in a mystery of this kind, where no letters are left giving the usual explanations, Dame Rumor takes a hand in with the Man with a Theory, and between the two many plausible hypothesis are set forth. One that finds general credence, but which is denied by the young lady's friends, is that Thomson's parents were opposed to the match, and had threatened to disown him in case he insisted on marrying her. It is said that this accounts for the stoppage of remittances. Friends of the young woman, in denying this theory, assert that Mr. Thomson's system had become run down through over-training. This, coupled with his passionate love for Miss McKechnie and the worry about the shortness of cash so preyed on his mind that in a moment of sheer folly and despondency he was led to commit the act. Nothing could have been more tragic. Drifting with the Thames on a calm, clear night, with all nature asleep and the quiet of a slumbering city just behind him, satisfied with the knowledge that the woman whom he loved would follow him, young, well connected, with the best part of life before him, it is hard to imagine a more tragic act, or yet a more foolish one. He was far from home, yet among friends. He had borrowed the last few cents that were in his possession from the hotel clerk, and was of too sensitive a disposition to make his position known to his friends. He had not been used to running short of spending money, and he did not take kindly to it. Once he borrowed \$15 from the hotel clerk and went to New York. When he returned he repaid the \$15 loan, tendering a \$100 note

in payment. COULD NOT STAY AWAY.

He did not seem to be able to break away from the fascination of his sweetheart. He had twice left for New York and home, only to return. He took his trunks with him and left them at New York and brought back only the small valise that was found in his room at the hotel. He came back the first time on hearing of Mr. McKechnie's death, but afterwards left to join an agent at New York and proceed to Glasgow. The agent sailed without him, and Thomson returned to London well supplied with money. He seemingly lacked firmness, or as one of his friends put it, "backbone."

THE PURSE STRINGS WERE TIGHTENED. During his stay Mr. Thomson spent on an average \$10 a day. Whether the other members of the firm thought that this was too much, or whether the family tried to induce him to return home by cutting off his supply, it is hard to say.
