Toronto Grain Market.

Toronto, April 11.—Wheat—The offerings continue small; the demand is fair, and the market is firm at 77c for red, and 78c for white wheat. Manitoba wheat is steady, and it is expected now that the opening of navigation is approaching, that all red wheat will be held higher. No. 1 hard is quoted at 60c, asked, Fort William, May; it is quoted at 58c, North Bay, and sold today at 58c, grinding in transit. No. 2 hard and No. 1 northern are quoted at 77c to 78c, North Bay. Flour—The market is dull, but is

steady; cars of straight roller are quoted at \$3.50 to \$3.60, Toronto freights. Manitoba flour is in moderate demand. Milled—Dull; cars of bran are offered on truck here at \$12, and shorts and bran are quoted at \$11 west. Sear—Dull; No. 1 is quoted at 40c. No. 2 at 35c, and cars of feed at 30c, outside. Buckwheat—Nominal at 32c to 32 1/2c, east.

Corn—Steady; sales of cars of mixed at 31c and yellow at 32c west. Oats—Steady at 21 1/2c for mixed, and 22c for white.

Peas—Unchanged at 48c for cars of No. 2, north and west.

Chicago, April 11.—The wheat market was a waiting one today in anticipation of the Government report, the close being 10c to 12c higher than yesterday. Corn was unchanged, and oats advanced 1/2c. Provisions were dull and weak.

Chicago, April 11.—Hogs—Receipts today, 12,000; left over, 1,000; firm, and selling light, \$3.50 to \$3.60; medium, \$3.35 to \$3.40; heavy, \$3.40 to \$3.55; rough, \$3.40 to \$3.60.

Cattle—Receipts, 500; unchanged. Sheep—Receipts, 2,000; steady.

SALE OF SHEEP SKINS.

London, April 11.—A sale of wool skins was held in the morning at the Wool Exchange, at which 1,740 bales of Cape Good Hope and Natal skins were offered. The attendance of buyers was large, but the competition was moderate, and the general quality of the offerings disappointing. Comings ranged from 20s to 25s. The market was on an occasional small advance.

Clothing wools were ungraded. The sales will take place on May 14 and 15. Widener & Co. wool brokers.

Report Australian merinoes firm, and frequently 1-8d higher; cross breeds 1-4d higher, and Cape of Good Hope and Natal wools were unchanged.

The firmness of the clothing wools, they say, is due to purchase by French felt mongers.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

—Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, set out some real ones in this morning from a butcher named Wm. Jeffrey, who lives near the Asylum.

—Messrs. H.A. Everett and Wm. Christie, of Cleveland, were in the city yesterday, looking over the street railway. Mr. Christie has charge of the overhead work on the Everett lines.

—Mr. Arthur Hogue, who has superintended the street railway here, leaves for Cleveland on Monday, and will wire a new line now being built between Lakeside and Cleveland.

—The East Middlesex House commissioners will meet on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, at the City Hall, upon by deputations from the temperance organizations of the city.

—In reference to a report in a contemporary, it may be stated that Ald. John Marshall, who has been ill, is progressing as favorably as can be expected. His many friends will hope he may soon be able to be himself again.

—In justice to Mr. Daniel Gray, who was charged at the Police Court yesterday with maliciously damaging a car belonging to the City of London, it should be stated that the case was dismissed because it was proven that he was out of the city at the time, and that it must have been a case of mistaken identity.

—The joint committee of Elgin and Middlesex county council met in the county engineer's office Friday, and awarded the contract for the new bridge north of Burton to Isaac Croome, Westminster, for \$284.

—Specifications call for the completion of the structure by June 1. As the bridge is partly down, it was decided to allow Mr. Croome \$2 per day for every day he has the contract completed before the time called for.
