Judge Walter G. Gresham has accepted the portfolio of United States Secretary of State.

There were four deaths from typhus fever and two new cases were reported on Sunday in New York.

The ice in the Hudson River, opposite Troy, N. Y., and below the State dam, broke up Saturday.

Mr. Cleveland's inauguration as President will cost about \$25,000, half of which will be spent in illuminating and decorating the ball room.

Dr. Norvin Green, the president of the Western Union Telegraph Company, died in Louisville, Ky., on Sunday morning. He was 78 years old.

The belated City of Peking brought to San Francisco from the Orient opium valued at \$240,000, the duty on which will amount to \$147,000.

The first section of the Krupp gun exhibit has arrived at the World's Fair grounds, Chicago. The installment required 31 flat cars for its transportation.

Sir Henry Thomas Coghlan, baronet, of England, has died, leaving a fortune of \$3,000,000 to be divided among his heirs, the eldest of whom is Mrs. Michael Hanley, of Minneapolis, Minn.

The peach crop on the mountain side is reported safe, and there is reason to believe that the crop on the other side of the Chesapeake is at least three-fourths all right, says a Baltimore dispatch.

CRUSHED!

Disaster in a Vermont Quarry—Seven Men Killed and Many Injured.

RUTLAND, Vt., Feb. 12.—One of the worst disasters in the history of marble quarrying occurred at West Rutland a little after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon in a quarry operated by the Vermont Marble Company. A great mass of stone fell into the quarry and seven men were instantly killed and a number of others injured. The killed are Wm. Luker, Frank Sulig, Edward Powers, Alexander Binquet and three unrecognized men. The quarry was opened in 1868. Depth and surface considered, it is the largest quarry in the world. Its perpendicular depth is over 250 feet, and from this the quarry runs eastward and downward under the hill 800 feet more. The accident was near the extreme end of the quarry, far under the hill. The killed and some of the injured were buried under tons of rock. The mass of stone which covered the men as near as can be estimated was 60 feet in length and twenty feet wide. It fell without the least warning. There were about 80 men at work in the quarry.

From the profits of the year your directors have been enabled, after defraying all expenses of management and all charges in connection with the issue of sterling debentures, to pay the half-yearly dividends of 4 per cent each, together with the shareholders' income tax of \$2,340 thereon, to add \$24,000 to the reserve fund and to increase the balance carried forward to \$4,746 9
