Rev. H. L. Roy met Mr. Owen at Mission and accompanied him to Vancouver. A large number of the members of the church were at the station to bid Mr. Owen welcome to his new field of work.

Mr. Owen stated he had a fine trip all the way out, and was delighted with the scenery in the mountains. Mr. Owen will be tendered a formal welcome to the church tomorrow evening by the wardens and congregation.

The event will be in the form of a social evening, and will be held in the school room of Christ Church. The Rev. Mr. Owen's former congregation in London were sorry to lose him, but what is London's loss is Vancouver's gain.

## CZAR'S VOLUNTEER FLEET

Intimated That It May Be Required Very Soon.

London, June 21.—It is believed that the first cruise of the Russian volunteer fleet, which is lying idle at Sebastopol and Odessa, is being held in the Black Sea for military exigencies, says the Odessa correspondent of the Times.

He adds that it is expected that an expedition was given on June 20 to the commanders of these vessels that there is a possibility of their being requisitioned to fly the naval flag before the present year is out.

## SCHOOL HAS STARTED

Class for Bible Study at Port Stanley Began Yesterday.

Sunrise Prayer Meeting and Fine Addresses Features of the Day.

The summer school for Bible study at Port Stanley, which is to be under the supervision of Rev. A. J. Langford, of Fingal, and the executives of London and St. Thomas district Epworth Leagues, opened yesterday with a sunrise prayer meeting at 6 o'clock, and a session for study at 9 o'clock, when Rev. D. E. Martin, of Brownsville, conducted the reading, C. B. Zeenleyside, B. A., of this city, gave an address on Japanese mission work. Rev. J. W. Holmes, of Port Stanley, also assisted in the service.

Rev. G. Howson, of the Askin Street Methodist Church, was unable to attend the evening service owing to illness, and in his absence addresses were given by Rev. A. J. Thomas, B.A., and Rev. Mr. Langford. Mr. Thomas based his talk on the incident of the woman at the well of Samaria. He said we should shake off our indifference and get a larger vision. We need a clear vision of our relations to Christ, for we were his agents. Our relationship with him should be one of unity. It should be one of service and of trust. We should have a relationship to our fellow-men. There was no room for spiritual aristocracy, but we need to have a conception of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. Our vision should be man-worthy of salvation and capable of service. Our watchword should be, "Lift up your eyes, look and see all that God is doing." Mr. Langford spoke upon the cost of efficiency. He said there were too many bargain hunters, people who wanted much for little. The law of cost was a moral and spiritual law, and it cost something to get a moral character that is worth the name. It cost to get spiritual character, that would pass the test of the greatest trial, and the cost was seen in true love, as was indicated in the night vigils of a mother. It cost to render kind service to another. It cost to be an officer or a member of the league—cost in heart-searching, and cost in management, in the moral and spiritual sphere in proportion to their cost.
