CANADA IS LOOKED TO

TO RAISE FUND OF \$50,000

This Is To Be in Honor of Centenary Next Year of British Bible Society.

Two very prominent Englishmen will appear here next month in advocacy of the centenary fund of the Bible Society.

This was the announcement made yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the Western Ontario Bible Society, which was held in the ministerial room at the Y. M. C. A.

The meeting was called for 4 o'clock, and considerable business was transacted. The insurance on stock was renewed. A new lease was entered into with the condition that it can be vacated with a month's notice.

This was arranged for in anticipation of the society's getting a new building of its own. A letter was read from the British and Foreign Bible Society of London, England, acknowledging the receipt of \$1,000 from the local society, and stating that the deputation concerning the centenary fund campaign would consist of Rev. G. H. Bondfield, who has been for many years one of the chief missionaries in China, and Sir Algernon C. C. Coote, Bart. who would begin their campaign in the eastern part of Canada and Newfoundland.

The executive committee also reported that 100 circulars in regard to this fund had been secured and would be sent out to the branches immediately.
