The facts of the case are as follows: Mr. Cochrane, who is secretary of a furniture factory of which McKeown is an employe, returning to his office discovered a letter addressed to Mc-Keown upon his desk. In the presence of a number of other workmen, Mr. Cochrane handed the letter to Mc-Keown. Greatly to the latter's surprise when opened it was found to contain three dollars. On the face of it the incident bears all the earmarks of a Conservative roorbach engineered to discredit the Liberal party and candidate.
