A GIANT CORPORATION

Jap and U. S. Financiers Forming International Banking House.

San Francisco, June 11.—Negotiations have been in progress for some time in San Francisco, it is said, looking to the organization of an international banking corporation by local capitalists and a Japanese syndicate, headed by President Asano, of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha. As planned the institution is to have a capital of \$10,000,000, and to be the dominating influence in the financial relations between the United States and the Orient. The movement to start the gigantic corcern came from Japan, with a propose that \$5,000,000 would be subscribed in that country, if the other half of the capitali-zation would be supplied in America. President Asano is said to be one of Japan's wealthiest men.
