**ALDERMEN DO NOT
FAVOR THE IDEA**

Of Allowing the Street Railway Company to Use Two Kinds of R. A. Is.

The question of allowing the London Street Railway to use a "T" rail instead of a grove rail on the Edward street belt was informally discussed at the meeting of the city council last night.
Acting Mayor Stevely explained that the bylaw for the new extension will come up on Thursday night, and a special meeting of the city council, as well as the matter of abolishing the company from the building of the Wortley road stub.
"If the company is permitted to use a 'T' rail, the manager is prepared to see that the new line is in operation by July 1, 1906," he said.
A letter from the city engineer was read, stating that on unpaved streets the "T" rail is every bit as good as the grove rail. He suggested that the rail should be of a heavy type, of say, somewhere between 68 and 72 pounds to the yard.
The aldermen did not like the idea of allowing the company to lay two kinds of rails in the city. At present the "T" rail is used on the Wellington street line to the Donnelly's and in West London, also to Springbank. The matter will be taken up again at the council meeting on Thursday night.

THE LATE JOHN BOYD

Council Passes Resolution and Declines to Attend Funeral.

At the special meeting of the city council last night, a resolution endorsing the memory of the late ex-Ald. John Boyd was passed unanimously.
Ald. Garratt, seconded by Ald. Matthews moved: "That the municipal council of the city of London do hereby place on record the sincere regret at the death of John Boyd, who, during his long and active life rendered enthusiastic and earnest service to the city, both in the capacity of private citizen and public servant, and who from 1877 to 1890 filled with acceptance various important offices on the board of aldermen, and that this expression of our sincere sympathy be suitable engrossed and placed in his widow and family in their bereavement."
On motion of Ald. Matthews the council decided to attend the funeral in a body and to send a wreath.

On the sands near Marske-by-the-Sea, Yorkshire, England, the other day a crab was seen running along the beach with a sparrow in its claws. The crab had caught the bird by the leg, and so much was it struggling to get free that it once lifted the crab several inches off the ground. The crab eventually let the bird go and ran off. As an instance of the jealousy existing in the relations between Norway and Sweden, it is pointed out that the boundary line between the two countries is the most minutely exact in the world. In every parish touched by the line there is deposited an elaborate plan, which is renewed every ten years, the whole of the work of surveying, etc., being carefully repeated each time.

Loan of \$40,000 May Be Made to the Tool Works

Council Will Make an Effort to Get Company to Remain in the City.

The city council, at a special meeting last night, decided to grapple with the problem of industries being induced to leave London, and will begin by waiting on the London Machine Tool Company for the purpose of finding out what the city can do to keep the firm here. Further, the committee appointed on the company will not go empty handed, and if the city solicitor says the city has the power to submit a bylaw to the people for the purpose of authorizing a loan of say \$40,000 to the company, the city will make such an offer to Mr. Yeates as an inducement for him to remain in London.
Acting Mayor Stevely briefly explained the situation, and why he had called the special meeting. Though it was understood that the firm has practically decided to go to Hamilton, Mr. Yeates had told him that the matter was not definitely settled. He moved that a committee composed of Ald. Gerry, Garratt, Forristal, Matthews, and the mayor, be named to wait on the firm, and see what the city can do to keep the industry here.
Ald. Cooper declared that from all he had heard he believed the firm could be kept here. If other people can afford to help an industry to leave London, this city should be able to assist it to remain here.
Ald. Matthews remarked that it is too bad that industries are being lured away from London. The city doesn't appear to be able to get on many new industries, and the British policy of what we have we'll hold is not being followed out. He referred to an application for an extension of the \$40,000 to the firm, and the committee will then wait on Mr. Yeates and see what can be done to keep the city council here. A special meeting of the city council has been called for Thursday night, when the report of the committee will be received.

GLAD THE MIDWAY WAS CLEANED OUT

W. C. T. U. Passes a Resolution Regarding Fair Board's Action.

That the W. C. T. U. was well pleased with the action of the Western Fair directors in their purview of the Midway was shown at the meeting of the union yesterday, when a resolution was passed expressing satisfaction that some objectionable features had been eliminated from the fair.
The resolution was adopted after a general discussion by those present regarding the altered condition of affairs. Mrs. H. Ashplant, the president of this department, was presented with a bouquet of roses in appreciation of her work.
Mrs. D. A. McDermid and Mrs. Ashplant were elected to the W. C. T. U. to be held in Brockville on Oct. 24. The delegates were instructed to invite the provincial body to hold its next annual convention in this city. The next meeting of the W. C. T. U. will be the bi-monthly meeting. The officers will be elected at this meeting.

JOURNAL CHANGES HANDS

Mr. A. S. Smith, of St. Thomas, Now in Control of Paper.

St. Thomas, Sept. 26. — Today the purchase of the plant, goodwill and business of the Journal Publishing Company was completed. The new proprietor is A. S. Smith, of this city. The asset is a valuable one. Forty thousand dollars is said to have been the consideration for the plant.
Mr. J. S. Briery, of the Herald, Montreal, held the controlling interest, and with that possessed by the present manager, Mr. Smith, the new owner, Mr. Smith, the entire property comes under his control.
It is the oldest paper in the county, and has been an eminently successful publication.
Mr. Smith will enter into possession about Oct. 1.
