EXPORTING NIAGARA POWER

New York State Consumers Purchasing From Canadian Plant.

Toronto, April 19. - Financial papers announce that the Power Company has sold to New York State consumers 60,000-horse power per annum for a period extending to Apri, 1950, with renewal rights for 60 vears more. Inasmuch as the company is to develop 125,000-horse power, it will within its rights in exporting onehalf of that. The agreement says that whenever required the company shall whenever required the company shall supply at least one-half of its output to Canadian applicants. If, therefore, during the first year of operation 20,000-horse power was developed, and there was an application from Ontario for 12,000-horse power, all the company would be obliged to sell on this side would be 10,000.

Head Beaten to a Jelly.

The body of the murdered woman was found lying with the feet toward the east wall, in an alcove formed by the lean-to and the kitchen. The top of the head was almost beaten to a jelly; the hands were covered with blood from the club with which she had been beaten by the murderer, and her clothing was all disarranged. In the soft sand were many footprints left by the brute, but unfortunately sightseers who went to view the scene of the tragedy almost obliterated these before the arrival of the coroner.

The club with which the murder was committed is about two feet long, about one and one-quarter inches thick at the butt, and tapering down to about three-quarters of an inch at the small end. It was cut in an orchard, which stands a couple of hundred yards from the Covell home, the tree from which was taken being located close to the fence. A deep cut was made with the knife into the limb, and the strength of the man is shown by the fact that only half-cut through, the limb was wrenched off without stripping the bark in the least.
