While there has been a substantial increase in the number of immigrants who have entered Western Canada during the present year, there has been a slight falling off in the number of those coming in from the United States. In the half-year ended Sept. 30 last the number of immigrants entering Western Canada totaled 193,-690, compared with 147,760 in the corresponding period of 1906, or an increase for this year of 31 per cent. The decrease in the number of Americans entering Canada during the half of this year was 8 per cent, the total being 35,092, as against 37,983 for the six months of 1906. 
