A LONDON OLD BOY.

THE LAMTON ASSIZES

Several Important Cases Dealt With—
Harvest Home Festival.

Sarnia, Sept. 23.—The Sarnia
Realty Company, with a capital of
\$100,000, has been granted an Ontario
charter.

Harvest festival services will be held
in the English Church on the Sarnia
Indian reservation on Sunday, Sept.
27, at 4 p.m.

The large Groschaw, which was
aground in the St. Clair River, was
released last evening by the Reid
Wrecking Company's tugs. The barge
was not damaged and proceeded on
her way.

The Lamton assizes, before Mr.
Justice MacMahon, the case of Dunn
vs. London and Western Trusts Com-
pany was laid over until the non-jury
sittings of the high court in Novem-
ber, the plaintiff not being able to pro-
cure certain necessary papers in time
for the present sitting.

The case of the Michigan Savings
Bank of Detroit vs. John D. Noble, was
settled out of court. It was an action
to recover \$3,000, amount of a surety
bond given by Mr. Noble, of Petrolia,
to the bank, to secure payment of
promissory notes discounted by the
bank for the Robert Mitchell Machin-
ery Company, of Detroit.

In the action of Amadee Allard vs.
Cleveland Sarnia Sawmill Company,
his lordship, after viewing the scene
of the accident at the mill, in com-
pany with the jurors and counsel, de-
cided to try the case without the in-
tervention of the jury, and the latter
was discharged. Plaintiff claimed dam-
ages for the loss of two fingers of his
left hand as a result of injuries sus-
tained while in the company's employ,
through alleged defects in the machine
he was operating. Judgment received.

B. P. Morgan vs. McFee, et al., an
action arising out of the affairs of
the Oliver Motor Company, of which
plaintiff was the original president,
was dismissed.

Rev. E. T. Evans, pastor of St.
John's English church of this town,
has been granted six months leave of
absence by the Bishop of Huron. Rev.
Mr. Evans leaves next week for Eng-
land to visit his old home there. Mr.
Evans intended going to England
to remain there, but has been per-
suaded by Bishop Williams to resume
his work here at the end of his visit
to the Old Country.

Miss Cushman is 18 years old, and as
evening passed and she did not re-
turn, her parents became uneasy. She
had been keeping company for some
time with a young man named Edward
Calcott, who, until about a year ago,
was employed at Dexter's Mill.

London, Sept. 24.—Capt. Watt, and
crew of the schooner Grenade, which
was abandoned in mid-Atlantic on
Aug. 26, arrived yesterday from
Rotterdam where they were landed by
the steamer Manchester Spinner, which
rescued them.

The Grenade sailed from Campbell-
ton, N. B., bound for New York. She
ran into a gale, and was overcome by
the heavy seas, sinking so deep that
the crew had to seek refuge on the top
of the deckhouse. They spent four days
without food or water and had to lash
themselves to the vessel to prevent
being washed away.

CORBETT AND CASTRO

Former Will Endeavor to Have Lat-
ter's Decree Cancelled.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Sept. 24.—
Sir Vincent Corbett, the British min-
ister of Venezuela, who has been here
for the past three weeks, left for
Caracas last night on the steamer
Barabadian, via Curacao.

During his stay here the British
minister has been non-commun-
cative in regard to his mission, but it
is believed here that upon his return to
the Venezuelan capital he will en-
deavor to have rescinded President
Castro's decree, which was virtually
shut off trade between the West In-
dies and Venezuelan ports.

CROKER FEELS BAD

That Papers Publish False Reports of
His Horse, Rhodora.

Dublin, Sept. 24.—Richard Croker
has sent a letter to a sporting paper
in London, complaining of the treat-
ment the paper is according him in re-
porting matters. He points out that
since the appearance of his race horse
Rhodora paragraphs have frequently
been inserted in this paper giving un-
favorable accounts of her condition.
The inaccuracies of the reports, says
