WATER VOTE WILL NOW BE TAKEN

Commissioners Agree to Terms Laid Down by Hon. Mr.

WILL PUMP ON SUNDAYS

Wells To Be Tested to the Limit-Commissioner Darch Wanted to Drop the Whole Business.

At a special meeting of the water commissioners held this morning, the letter of Hon. Adam Beck, outlining the terms upon which he would allow the wells to be used by the city, was taken up, and were accepted with one change. In his communication Mr. Beck desired to pump the wells every day with the exception of Sunday. The commissioners want the wells pumped

every day, Sunday included. There was a warm discussion and some pointed things were said concerning Mr. Beck by the commissioners. Mr. Beck was not present, and Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., represented him. Some Changes.

Chairman Jones, in reading the letter, stated that some change had been made contrary to the agreement made at the Monday meeting, and he did not propose to stand for them. He wanted to know why the water could not be used immediately, and not until July 1. Mr. Beck had stated that he had to install a plant. There was no necessity for that, as the commis-sioners were willing to install the Then he found fault with the suggestion that the wells be pumped but six

MOIR ATTEMPTS TO MAKE ESCAPE

Overpowered His Guard in the Asylum at Hamilton

TRIED IT ONCE BEFORE

Proves To Be a Hard Man To Handle When He Has a Bad Spell.

Hamilton, May 27.—Private Moir, the soldier in the Royal Canadian Regiment, who shot and killed Sergt, Lloyd at Wolseley Barracks, London, about a year ago and was tried for murder and adjudged insane, was brought to this city some time ago and incarcerate ed in the asylum. He has not been a model patient since his arrival here. and has made two attempts to escaper A few nights ago he tore his bed sheets to ribbons and tried to tie up his guard in an endeavor to make his escape. He had almost succeeded in overpowering the guard when assistance was rendered by a couple of warders, who happened to be passing the cell when the struggle was going on and Moir was pinioned and the guard set free. Some weeks ago he tried to get out in about the same manner, but since

then had been quiet. At the trial of Moir it was sworn that he was suffering from epilepsy and that he became insane at times and did not know what he was doing He was sentenced to spend the remainder of his life inside the walls of Costume Company, who have a power the local asylum. His bad spells are fortunately of rare occurrence, but the guards have been warned to keep close watch on him.

Dr. English, superintendent of the asylum, said today that he did not wish to discuss the matter at all. "He about it the better," was all he would say in answer to a Spectator reporter's questions.
