Washington, June 11.—Walter Johnson, the youthful pitching "phenom" of Mike Cantillon's tail-enders, had the hard-hitting batsmen of Hughie Jennings' team eating from his hand today, and the Champions were unable to get a man across the plate, during the nine innings of play. Washington did but a little better. Only one Senator tally was registered during the same period. That one came in the third and it proved enough to land a victory for the Nationals in the first game of the series.

Johnson in Good Form.
Johnson had everything today. He allowed the Champions but four hits, made seven of them fan the breeze and passed but one Tiger during the contest, that one purposely. In six of the innings the Tigers were retired in order. Once or twice there were fears that the league leaders might score. A hit was all that was needed to turn the trick, but the Washington twirler prevented the occurrence by striking the batsman out or making him pop an easy one to the infield.

Killian in the Box.
Eddie Killian, the Tigers' veteran pitcher, opposed the Washington giant in the box. Killian pitched a first-class game, despite the Champions' defeat, and under ordinary circumstances would have secured the victory. There were but three more bingles made off his twirling than the Senator youngster permitted. Killian's one fault, however, was his inability to locate the plate, and this cost him the one run that the Nationals obtained and the game.

Tigers Played Ball.
The Tigers did not disappoint the fans with their playing. Neither team made a misplay during the game and a number of sensational catches by the visitors brought the crowd to its feet several times during the game. In the fielding line, Bush's work especially created much favorable comment, the youngster handling his six chances in perfect style.

Besides Johnson, Street was a big factor in the defeat of the Champions. His faultless throwing caught several of the Champions who attempted a steal and not one of the best Tigers succeeded in purloining a sack.

"CY" BESTS HIS OLD TEAMMATES

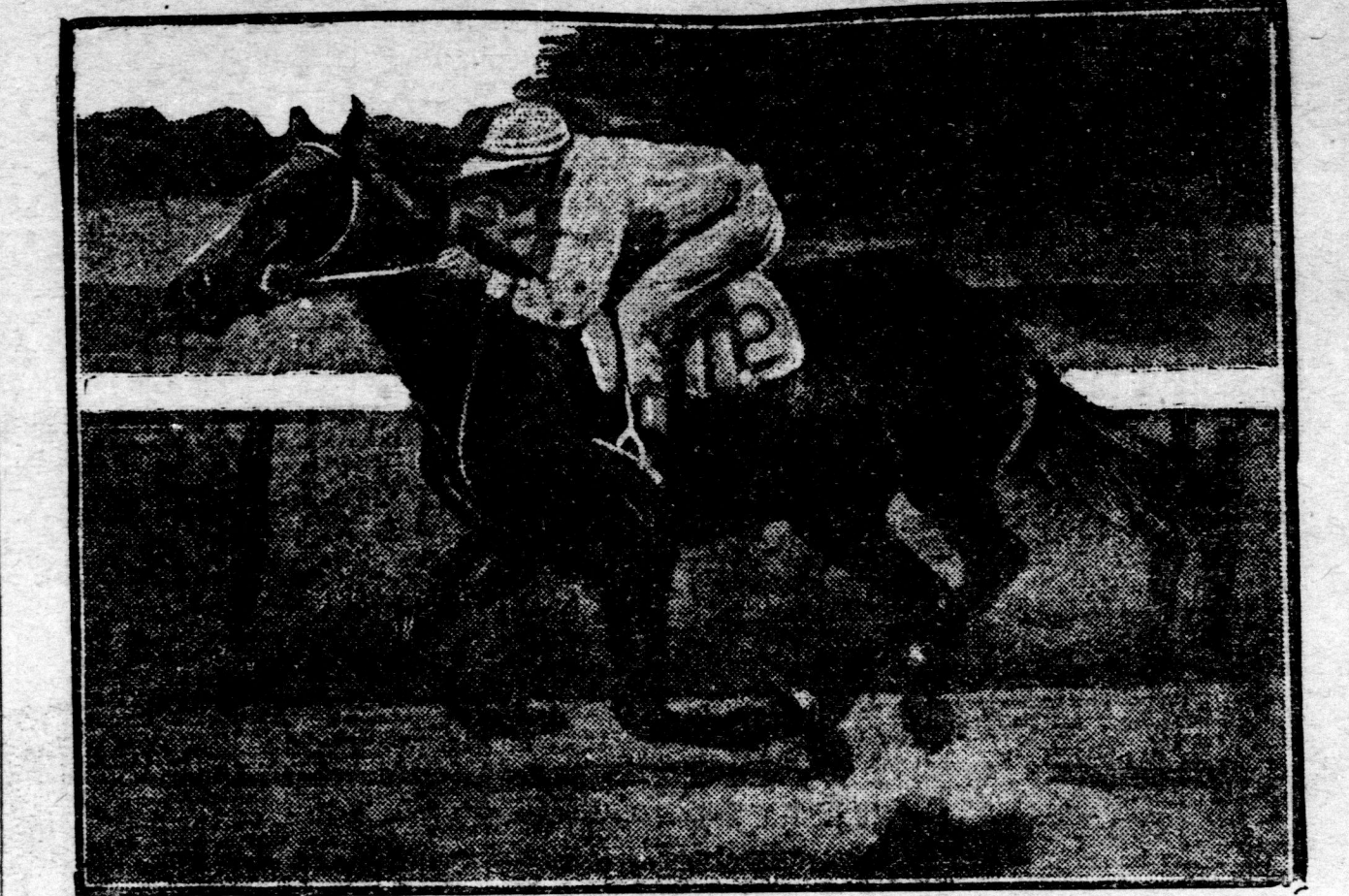
Red Sox Get But Two Hits and Cleveland Wins 3 to 1.
