MANY WERE NIPPED IN HEINZE "PLANT"

The Stocks Were Hypothecated After Being Put Up As Security.

New York, Aug. 12.—With a second charge lodged against F. Persch, the young note broker who was arrested, charged with the larceny of copper stocks belonging to F. Augustus Heinze, is still a prisoner, and while there were no additional arrests, the district attorney's office has ascertained that he was not alone in the transactions. The case will be placed before the grand jury today, and the evidence at hand, it is said, will reveal a systematic scheme, worked not only in this city, but in Philadelphia and Boston, whereby stocks supposed to be tucked safely in the vaults of banks have in reality been pledged to individuals who placed them on the market at a profit; and though Mr. Heinze, according to Wall street's analysis of the affair, was at first thought to be the particular victim, it has come out through the district attorney's office that other men have suffered likewise.

One man at least was thus nipped. He is J. M. Everett, of Boston, whose New York bankers, Messrs. Cram, Milliken & Co., made the additional charge against young Persch. According to that firm, Persch negotiated a loan of \$7,000 on stock owned by Mr. Everett. The stock in question was 100,000 shares of the Eclipse Oil Company, and the name of Henry F. Risborough, of Philadelphia appears as the man who furnished the money. Coincidentally, one of Mr. Risborough's references was Charles Katz, the Brooklyn broker who has been mentioned in the Heinze loan. The method in the Everett case, according to the charge made, was similar to that through which the Heinze copper stocks were put on that curb—that is, the stocks were hypothecated after having been put up as security. Carlos Warfield, vice-president of one of the Heinze copper companies, is also said to have lost considerable money through the same stock-shifting game. Witness after witness was questioned at the district attorney's office and further developments are expected. The men higher up whom Persch intimated were associated with him have not as yet been pinned down definitely.

The young broker tried hard to obtain his release through habeas corpus proceedings, but after a lengthy argument in the supreme court session was reserved, and with his bail still standing at \$50,000 he was forced to go back to the Tombs.

On the basis of the checks signed by Persch, which were unearned, the district attorney's office estimated that the profits from the sale of Heinze's stock was approximately \$52,000.

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BALK AT PAYING FOR HOSPITAL WALKS

Special Committee's Surplus Is Rapidly Fading Away.

The surplus of the special hospital committee shows every symptom of fading away. Some time ago it was triumphantly announced that the Isolation Hospital account had something over \$1,000 remaining. The hospital trust have made suggestions to the committee for spending the money, and these suggestions will likely be carried out.

At the meeting of the committee last evening, these suggestions were dealt with. One was to fence the grounds about the Isolation Hospital. The estimated cost was \$410. Ald. Saunders thought that the work should be done right, and moved that tenders be called for the fence.

A ceiling was also discovered to be necessary in the laundry, and the estimated cost was placed at \$300. Tenders will be called for that. It will have to be painted, the estimated cost of that being \$150, and Ald. Garratt suggested that tenders be called for that work. This was agreed to.

Won't Pay for Walks.

The committee balked on the suggestion that the hospital trust that the committee pay for the walks at the rear of the hospital. Since spring, walks costing \$24 have been laid, and the trust thought the committee should pay for this work, since there was a surplus.

Ald. Garratt opposed that, and the committee decided not to pay for the walks.

Contractor W. S. Davidson put in a bill for \$20 for cleaning the hospital. Ald. Garratt objected to paying the bill, as it was the custom for contractors to put buildings in a clean state upon completion. However, Ald. Stewart and Architect Nutter ordered the work done, so the committee authorized the payment of the account.

Those present were Ald. Stewart, chairman; Ald. Fitzgerald, Ald. Moorhead, Ald. Garratt, Ald. Saunders, City Architect Nutter and Secretary Baker.

COMMITTEE OBJECTS TO HANDING BACK MONEY

Applications for Refunds of the License Fees Were Coldly Received Last Night.

Routine business occupied the attention of No. 3 committee last evening, and it was soon disposed of.

A restaurant keeper asked for a refund of his license as he had been in business but a month, and then disposed of it. The communication was filed.

Mr. T. Blanchard asked for a refund of his rent on a fish stall for July as his business had been interrupted by the city. The letter was filed.

Will Collect Picture Show.

The committee instructed Inspector McCallum to collect the license fee of an east end picture show, or close it up. The theatre managers have not paid the license fee, and the inspector will collect it at once.

Fire Chief Aitken was sent as the city's representative to the annual fire chiefs' convention to be held in Grand Rapids, Mich., next week.

It was suggested that the chairman of the committee go but Ald. Moorhead objected on the ground that there had been enough deputations this year.

Check for Firemen.

Chief Aitken also reported that he had received a check for \$50 from Mr. W. J. Reid, in appreciation of the work done by the department at the residence.

The report of the board of health regarding a garbage disposal system was filed.

Chatham, Aug. 11.—Word has been received here from Ridgetown of the drowning of 12-year-old Lottie Gillson on Tuesday afternoon in Campbell's mill pond. The little girl was playing with a companion upon the edge of the pond, when she slipped and fell into the water. Her playmate summoned Mrs. Shaw, a neighbor, who attempted, but in vain, to rescue the drowning girl with a rail. Messrs. Ferguson, Lawrence and Eansor, with the help of a boy, recovered the body, but all attempts at resuscitation were unavailing.

The main building in connection with the Western Fair of this year will present many changes to the visitors. In the art gallery and annex, the old wooden rail has been replaced by a new bronze one, giving the room a much better appearance. The Woman's Art Club, of Toronto, will make a very large exhibit this year of their handicrafts, laces and homespun work.

A laceworker will be in attendance, and a new addition to their work will be an enamel-worker, which will be something new and very interesting. There have been diplomas offered for penmanship for both city and county scholars and a good entry is looked for. Two special cash prizes are being offered for miniature Western Fair posters, which should bring out a good exhibit.

A new section added this year is one for a collection of native goods, for which three good cash prizes are given.

The ladies' department has received special attention this year. Several hundred dollars have been expended on new glass showcases, and more room will be given to the display of the ladies' work.

The increase of interest in this department the last few years, and the large increase in the number of entries, have induced the management to undertake this expense, and also to set aside more room, as it is felt to be unfair to some of the exhibitors that they should not have room to be displayed.

Ample space has, therefore, been set apart for this year, and a large entry is expected. Intending exhibitors should make their entries early so that proper attention can be given them.
