Paris Protest Allowed, and Junior Game With Preston Must Be Played Over—Midland Drops.

Toronto, Jan. 11.—At a meeting of the O. H. A. sub-committee the protest of the Paris junior club against the Preston club, on account of the poor lighting of the rink at Preston for the game of Jan. 4, was allowed. The Preston club not defending the protest. Referee James Fraser, of Galt, reported that the lighting was wretched, so the game was ordered to be replayed on Friday, Jan. 28, at Preston. However, if the lighting at the Preston rink is not improved, there will be no more games in that rink.

Must Explain.
Kenneth Randall, of Oshawa, will be asked to explain an alleged attack on Charles Blanchard, of Whitby, who refereed the Cobourg game in Oshawa last Friday night, in the absence of the regular referee.

A change of residence permit was granted to Charles Bodborough to play with Belleville, on the evidence of prominent citizens of Pictou, his former home.

EDMONTON TEAM
LOOKS VERY FAST

Western Players Confident They Can Lift the Stanley Mug—History of the Players.

Toronto, Jan. 12.—The Edmonton hockey team, steadily and challengers, will arrive in Toronto at 3:30 this afternoon, on their way to Ottawa to play for the cup next Tuesday and Thursday. They will leave for the east tonight, stopping over at Peterboro for a practice. The players are making the trip on the co-operative plan, hoping to make some money out of exhibition games on their way home.

Six of the seven players on the team are graduates of the O. H. A. Winnipeg, the point player, being the only player not born and brought up in Ontario. Something about the history of each player is appended.

William Field, point, weighs 165 pounds. He started his career with the Westmount intermediate team. He remained in Montreal until 1907, going west to Winnipeg in the fall of 1907. He has since played with the Winnipeg and St. Paul teams. Last year he played with Edmonton when they won the P.H.C. cup.

Jack Miller, right wing, was born in Keene, Ont., in 1883. He weighs 178 pounds, starting his career at the age of 12 years with the Trent Valley League, with the Keene club. The following three years he was a member of the Norwood team in the same league. In the fall of 1902, he came to Midland, playing with that team in the O. H. A. for one season. In the summer of 1904 he went west to Alberta, where he resided some time on his ranch. He went to Edmonton in 1907, where he joined the Edmonton team, remaining with them ever since.
