Although the Speaker did not mount the dais until 4:15, there was not a member of the Opposition present until nearly half an hour later. The Government virtuously resisted the temptation to rush through a bill wiping the Opposition out of existence

The First to Fall.

The first measure to fall by the wayside was one sponsored by Mr. innes (North Norfolk). Its innocent wording, "to repeal chap, 249, R. S. O., 1897," concealed its deadly purpose which was nothing short of wiping out the legislation providing for compulsory vaccination, thus allowing municipalities and individuals to suit themselves. Mr. Innes in moving the second reading of the bill, said a considerable body of public opinion was against compulsory vaccination, and the bill met the wishes of this class. Hon, Mr. Lucas said that the gen-

eral question of vaccination had been discussed and settled by the House some years ago. A uniform law was that it would be better to place 100 desirable, and no good could come of further discussion at the present time. 
