

#### New Course For Industrial School

A deputation of the sheet metal workers of the city waited on the Industrial School authorities to impress on them the necessity of establishing a class in sheet metal working. They pointed out that they represented a large and very important industry in London and one that requires much technical skill and training. For many years those entering the sheet metal industry had been handicapped by the lack of proper means of instruction. No one can hope to become an efficient sheet metal worker who does not understand sheet metal draught-
