CAR THIEVES CONFESS WHOLESALE ROBBERIES

The Losses Since February Will
Exceed \$100,000, Say
Detectives.

Toledo, Oct. 22.—Detroit and Toledo detectives and local police today made eight arrests, obtained several confessions, and recovered part of loot valued at \$100,000, stolen from local freight houses and cars of the Lake Shore, Pennsylvania, Big Four and Toledo and Ohio Central Railroads since Feb. 1 last.
The men under arrest are one merchant, one drayman, one saloon-keeper, and five railroad freight checkers. The sheriff and his deputies, scouring the county, are in search of many others whom the confessions implicate.
Several wagonloads of plunder, including barrels of whiskey, whole cases of cigarettes, bolts of silk, and quantities of other merchandise and metals have been recovered.
According to the police, the assistant whom they had employed as a freight checker, ascertained that goods regularly checked in and out, were turned over to draymen and dealers in the thieves' organization.

TRAGEDY FOLLOWED SPENCER FAMILY

Three Suicides Among Relatives of
Chicago Murderer.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—The case of Henry Spencer, the confessed murderer, now awaiting trial for killing Mrs. Mildred Allison Rexroat, has aroused widespread interest among students of criminology. These facts have been brought to light:
That his father, a life-long victim of alcoholism, died a suicide.
That three years after his father's death Spencer's oldest brother took his own life.
That one of his sisters killed herself out of despondency after Spencer had been sentenced to his first term in prison.
That a third sister, married, and, after bearing two children, died of tuberculosis.

MARRIAGE ANNULLED AT BRIDE'S REQUEST

Publication Was Not Made According to Law, Says Judge.

Montreal, Oct. 22.—Annulment of the marriage celebrated between two French people, Miss L. A. Dury and Joseph Audrin, on Aug. 29, 1902, in the Isle of Jersey, was granted yesterday by Judge Charbonniere, on the petition of the former. The judge bases his decision on the grounds of clandestinity and because the defendant was a minor.
The judge pointed out that, according to the French law, publication of a marriage must be made by an officer of the civil state of the domicile of the parties at the door of the city hall, announcing the surnames, profession, domicile and residence of the future spouses, as well as of their parents and further that this publication can be obtained, must precede a marriage contracted in a foreign country between French subjects or between a Frenchman and a foreigner.
The marriage in the present case was not contracted publicly, but in a foreign country, and was not preceded by the necessary publication.

WILL ENTER ACTION IF BYLAW CARRIES

St. Marys Firm Writes Council
That Proposed Vote Is
Illegal.

St. Marys, Oct. 22.—The town council held a busy session last evening. The clerk presented several communications. From Weir & Weir, calling the attention of the council to the fact that it is illegal to submit the Carter Company flour mill bylaw upon the ground of their being in the same line of business, and that they would take action against it if the bylaw carried by the required number of votes. No action.
From the secretary of the Collegiate Institute board, with a copy of resolution passed to ask council to provide \$3,000 to build a gymnasium and convocation hall. Request granted and debentures will be issued to run a number of years.
From the legal firm of Beatty & Blackstock, Toronto, an account for services rendered re application to Legislature in reference to cement bylaw as the cement company paid its own account, filed.
From the secretary of the joint committee re industrial prison farm meeting recently held at Brantford. No action.
Messrs. C. W. Coupland, R. J. Hine, and J. Wilkie formed a deputation of directors of South Perth Agricultural Society, which intends draining and beautifying the fair grounds, asked the council for the use of corporation team and man for a few days' work. Agreed that chairman of the board of works will help out.
A resolution was passed instructing the clerk to find out what steps would be necessary to arrange for the taking of the assessment this fall in order that the semi-annual tax collections may be gone on with in the year 1914.
The Falconer Bros' matter for maintenance and turning property over to the town of St. Marys was left with the finance committee with power to act.
Finance committee's report of expenditures, amounting to \$402.67, was passed.

New Course For Industrial School

A deputation of the sheet metal workers of the city waited on the Industrial School authorities to impress on them the necessity of establishing a class in sheet metal working. They pointed out that they represented a large and very important industry in London and one that requires much technical skill and training. For many years those entering the sheet metal industry had been handicapped by the lack of proper means of instruction. No one can hope to become an efficient sheet metal worker who does not understand sheet metal draughting.
Chairman Gammage thought that every effort should be made to cater to the needs of this important industry. It is indeed a compliment to the work of the school that a deputation should make such a request. Those in the industry who know the needs best recognize most the value of the work which the school is doing. It was decided to open a class for sheet metal workers.

EXTEND TORONTO

Meeting of Municipalities to Discuss
Metropolitan Area Question.

Toronto, Oct. 22.—Representatives from the municipalities from Port Union, on the east, Newmarket on the north, and Brampton on the west, are meeting with representatives of Toronto today to discuss the metropolitan area question proposed by Toronto. The idea is for the various municipalities to co-operate with Toronto with a view to the larger development of this district. Many of the municipalities are in favor of the proposition, but it is doubtful if the proposition will meet with favor expected unless the city can show that the individual interests of each separate municipality will not be impaired.

WORLD'S W.C.T.U. TO CONVENE IN BROOKLYN

Forty White Ribboners Will
Attend Big Gathering From
London, England.

New York, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Delegates from 30 foreign countries and from all over the United States began arriving here today to take part in the triennial world's convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union which will begin on Friday in the Academy of Music, Brooklyn, and continue until Oct. 28.
Two "white ribbon" special from Chicago, and Birmingham, Ala., brought several hundred from the west and south, and many more poured in from near-by cities on the regular trains. Incoming steamships brought others, although most of the foreign delegates were already here. Lady Aurea Howard of England, heads a delegation of forty "white ribboners" from that country. Boy Scouts acted as escorts for the visitors.
The formal opening of the convention is to be preceded by committee meetings tonight and by devotional services at Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, tomorrow. Richard Pearson Hobson is on the program as the principal speaker at a mass meeting in the cause of temperance to be held in Brooklyn on Sunday. There will be addresses, too, by prominent delegates at the Sunday services in more than a hundred Brooklyn churches.

GRANT REFUSED

Winnipeg City Council Will Not Help
Exhibition Board.

A money bylaw for \$1,000,000 to extend the power plant was passed and will be voted on in December.
